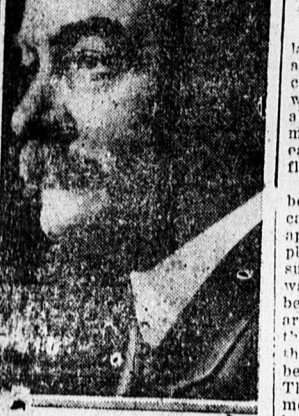

TURKS LIBERATE FRENCH PRISONERS RECENTLY TAKEN

PARIS, June 18.—The "Temps" says today that the French battalion, which had been occupying Bizana, in Sicilia, Asia Minor, and which was captured recently by the Turks, numbered ten officers and 550 men. Their capture, the "Temps" adds, took place before the armistice between the French and Turkish Nationalists went into effect. No news of the liberation of the French prisoners had reached Paris up to this morning.

GARDEN INSECT PESTS

Cabbage Root Maggot—Imported Onion Maggot—By W. A. Ross Cabbages, cauliflowers and related crops are very subject to the attack of a small whitish maggot, called the cabbage root maggot, which burrows into and, when abundant, destroys the roots. The maggot is especially destructive to early varieties of cabbage and cauliflower.

Within the past few years it has been demonstrated that this pest can be readily controlled by the application to the roots of the plants of a solution of corrosive sublimate, 1 oz. in 10 gallons of water. The first application should be made four days after the plants are set out, care being taken to thoroughly wet the soil. Then two more applications should be made at intervals of seven days. The mixture may be applied by means of a watering can with a long spout, the end of which should be plugged to allow only a small stream to issue.

The Imported Onion Maggot—Only too frequently crops of onions are partially or completely destroyed by the ravages of small white root-maggots, which feed on the bulbs and ultimately reduce them to a rotten mass. The parents of the maggots are small two-winged flies, resembling the common house fly.

Recent experiments at Ottawa conducted by the Dominion Entomological Branch and elsewhere have shown that the onion maggot can be satisfactorily controlled by killing the parent flies with a poisoned bait spray made as follows: One quart of an ounce of sodium arsenite dissolved in one gallon of boiling water; and one pint of cheap molasses is then added to this.

This mixture when it has cooled, should be sprinkled over the plants by means of a watering can with a small nozzle. Large plots of onion may be treated quickly by the operation beginning at one end of the plot and walking diagonally across the plot, back and forward in a V-shaped manner, the strip being about 15 or 20 feet apart at the wide end. The first application should be made when the plants are about three or four inches high and four or five further applications should be made at intervals of about a week.

EFFECT OF OIL IN SEALING PISTONS



J. H. O'C. writes: After overhauling my engine I notice that gas seems to leak past the pistons and through the valves when it is cranked, although the valves have just been ground. The crank case and manifolds are not yet on and I want to know whether new piston rings are needed and whether the valves require further attention before putting the parts in place.

Answer: As the crank case is not yet replaced it is quite likely that leakage past the pistons is due to lack of oil on the piston rings. It is the oil that seals the rings and makes pistons gas tight, and you better wait until the lubrication system is operating before passing judgment upon the fit of the pistons. Before doing anything further to the valves make sure that there

NOISY VALVES

C. L. H. writes: The instruction book accompanying my car states that the valve-stem clearance should be not less than 0.004 inch and not over 0.008 inch. When I make the clearance a tight 0.005 inch the valves are quiet, but the fuel economy is poor. If I allow 0.006 inch clearance I can get between 20 to 25 m. p. g., but the valves are noisy. Should valves stems be smoothed off with emery paper to make them slide easily in the guides? If a felt washer were placed on the valve stem below guide but inside of spring, would it reduce the noise of the valve seating?

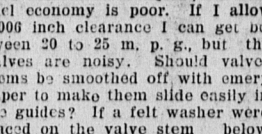


Answer: Your low gasoline economy, with the smaller clearance is due to the fact that it is sufficient to enable the valves to seat completely when the parts are hot. You will have to use the larger clearance and tolerate some noise, we four. The stems should of course be smoothed enough to keep them just free in their guides. We doubt if the felt washer will reduce the noise very much, but it may be worth trying. Probably the noisy valve seating is a result of the design of the cams. The valve lift may be rather large and the springs rather strong.

FREQUENCY OF VALVE GRINDINGS

C. L. H. writes: How many miles should an engine run between valve grindings? My engine will operate between 800 and 1,000 miles between carbon removals.



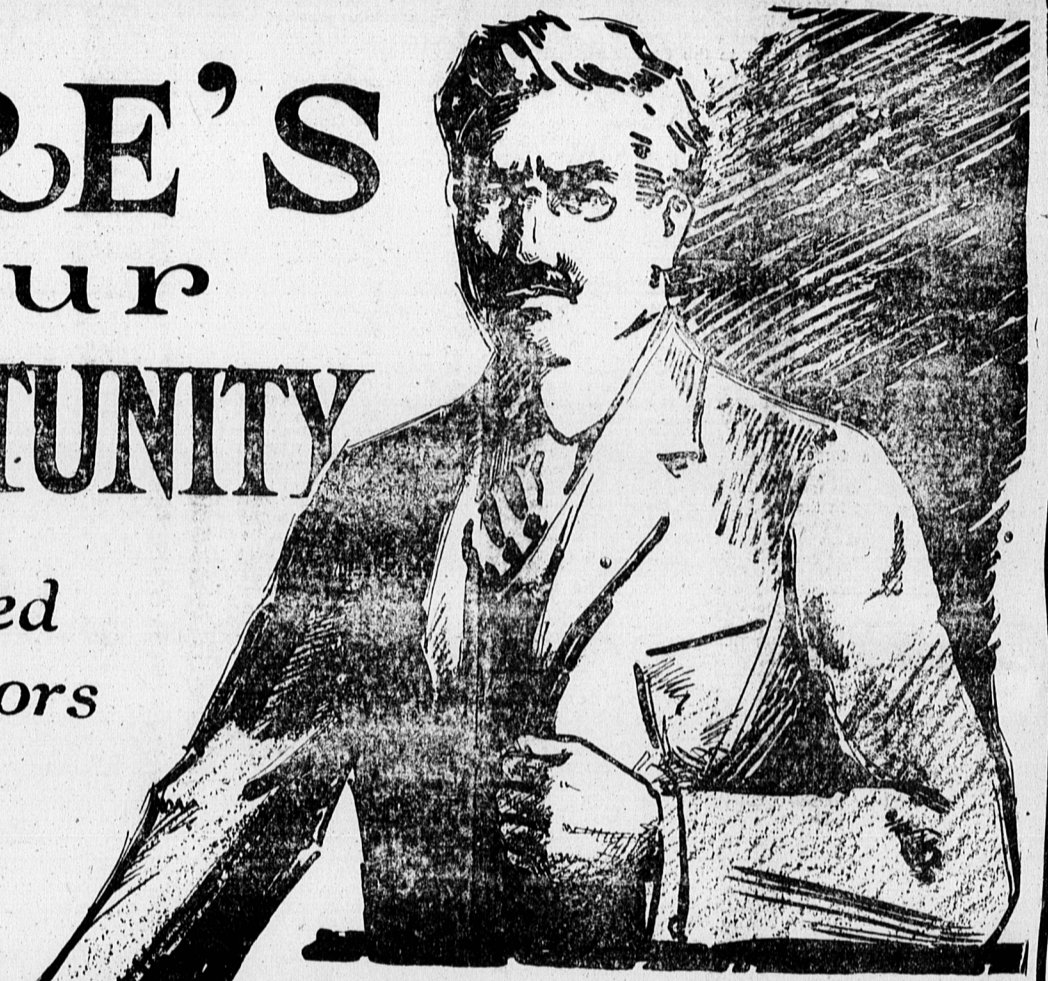
Answer: No general rule can be given as to this. The nature of the valve metal and the way an engine is operated and maintained are important factors. The exhausts usually require considerably more frequent grindings than the inlets. Under favorable conditions an engine should run several thousand miles without valve grinding. Leaky valves are best detected by cranking the engine over by hand. If compression is not well maintained probably necessary. Under existing fuel conditions your engine does not carburetor quicker than very many others. It is a good idea to test the valves just before removing the head for decarbonizing, as valve grinding is most easily done at the same time.

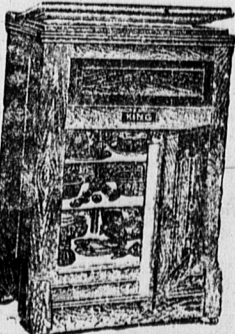
