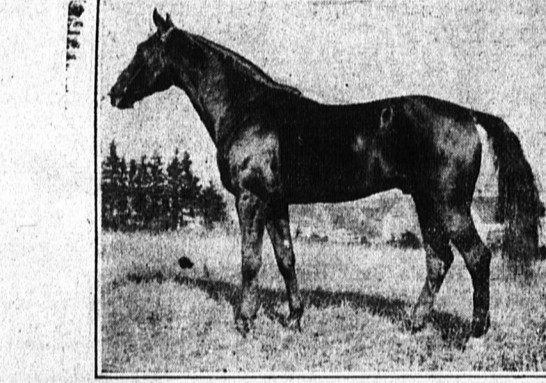
No horse in the City has travelled more miles than The Soldier the past winter and today he is fit for the show ring, he can be seen any time at 254 Kent St., Charlottetown.
