Holman's Main Office At S'Side Is Renovated

The main office of R. T. Holman Ltd., Summerside, has been completely re-planned and renovated with the object of greater efficiency and of giving better service to customers. While the work has not been completely finished yet the results so far, according to an official of the firm show a remarkable increase of efficiency with the work being channelled through evenly and with no peak or rush periods. The office is bright and airy with walls of birch plywood with a natural finish and the floor will be covered with battlement linoleum. The whole appearance is very attractive and when finished will be an important addition to the store.

Customers will be familiar with the old "lower" and "upper" offices. These are no more; it is all one office on the main floor level. The partition that divides it from the grocery department will be topped by plain glass that will give privacy to the office staff without shutting off light. With the main object that of efficiency the office has been departmentalized. The cash desk with three wickets is now along the main customers' aisle of the store. Immediately to the rear is the credit section and the accounts receivable are immediately behind the cash clerks so that accounts can be referred to with a minimum of effort.

The credit department has two cubicles where customers can discuss their credit problems in privacy with members of the credit department. A customer is first greeted by a receptionist at the credit section who promptly sees that his wants are attended to. The filing and addressograph section is located at the back of the office. Next to the credit section are the sales audit and stenography departments. An innovation is a private office for the general manager. Firm officials are particularly pleased that, while no more floor space has been occupied, it has been utilized more efficiently so that there is room for four more desks than in the old offices. Another factor is that this new and modern office has been provided on the main floor where it is of particular convenience to customers.—S.

(Continued from Page 1) party. No party believes more strongly than the Liberals do that individual initiative and private enterprise are essential to a healthy, prosperous and progressive nation.

Power Of The State

"The Liberal party is not prepared to turn the state into an instrument of exploitation; but Liberals are prepared to use the power of the state to help give all the people greater equality of opportunity and to protect the public from exploitation by selfish interests. That, I believe, is the position most Canadians think is right; and that is the great strength of the Liberal appeal."

Mr. St. Laurent said he had wanted to seek a mandate from the people ever since taking office last year. But there were certain things that had to be done first, including the entry of Newfoundland, the Atlantic Pact, emergency measures and presentation of a financial accounting to Parliament. All this had been done.

One reason for the Government's accomplishments was that it was not a one-man government "but a team of exceptionally able men." Hardly a year had passed without new faces appearing in the cabinet.

"Canada today is, in fact, an adult nation; we want that fact to be fully recognized in our constitution and laws, and we want as well to give encouragement to the expression of the national spirit of the Canadian people."

"We are asking you now for a new mandate—a mandate to continue to work for peace and security, for trade and prosperity, for full employment and social security, for complete recognition of Canadian nationhood and the development of all aspects of our national life."
