MARITIME RELIGIOUS EDUCATION COUNCIL

The Training Institute for Sunday School workers recently held in the Sydney was a decided success.

The Institute was held for three evenings in Sydney, three in Glouce Bay and three in a district comprised of North Sydney, Florence and Sydney Mines.

The first session at Sydney opened with a supper gathering at which about 100 persons were present and in spite of strong counter attractions the interest was good throughout the other sessions and the attendance encouraging, at Glouce Bay about fifty were present at the first meeting and the number increased from night to night.

In the other district the first meeting was held in North Sydney and the other two at Sydney Mines and here too the response on the part of the workers was heartening with an average attendance of about 60.

On every side expressions of appreciation were heard and the Institute was clearly recognized by the workers in the constituency served as of the utmost benefit and as a contribution of the most practicable nature by the M. R. E. C.

At each of the nine sessions held Rev. F. M. Milligan delivered a lecture on "Teachers' Task" following which members of the Institute were divided into four groups, the Children's workers with Miss Alice M. Harrison, Children's Work Secretary of the M. R. E. C. the teen age girls' workers with Miss Marjorie Trotter, Girls' Work Secretary of the M. R. E. C. the teen age boys' workers with Rev. F. M. Milligan, Presbyterian Secretary and the Adult Teachers and Sunday School officers with Rev. Waldo C. Machum, Baptist Secretary.

During the stay of the Secretaries the three Sunday School districts were re-organized as follows: Glouce Bay district, Pres. Wm. Thorne, Glouce Bay; Secy-Treas. Miss Mildred Taylor, Glouce Bay; Sydney; Pres. M. W. Buchanan, Sydney; Secy-Treas. Miss Frances Blake, Sydney; North Sydney; Secy-Treas. Rev. W. R. Seeley, Sydney Mines; Acting Secy, Treas. Wm. Ahern, Sydney Mines.
