When an adult fox is presented for re-inspection and it does not conform to the standard set for registration it shall be so reported to the Canadian National Live Stock Records. It shall be known as a suspended fox. It may be killed or retained by the owner. If retained by the owner he shall not sell it, but shall hold it for re-inspection the following year, and if it does not then conform to the standard for registration for adults, it shall be tattooed by the Inspector with an arrow mark and must be killed by the fifteenth day of January next following.

Conan Doyle

(Continued from page four) most successful characters. In the South African War of 1899-1902 Conan Doyle went out as physician with a field hospital. His history of that war was a readable narrative and had a wide circulation. Another volume, dealing with the causes and conduct of the Boer War, won him a knighthood in 1902. During the Great War of 1914-1918 in which he lost a son, Conan Doyle wrote and published, amongst other works, "The British Campaign in France and Flanders" and it was at this time that his interest in a study of the occult became known. Bearing on this subject he published "The New Revelation" and the "Vital Message." Afterwards he put his pen away in order that he might devote his time and energies to expounding spiritualism. His sincerity was singularly manifest, and his faith, was inspiring to many. But the success of his public lectures on the subject to which he had devoted all his studies at home and in America was not always apparent. Latterly his name only found infrequent mention in the world's press. A brief paragraph reporting his illness, and reference to the fact that he was seventy-one years of age, prepared the public for news of his death yesterday. The high degree of Conan Doyle's reputation rests on his great mastery of the practical as well as fine art of the story teller.
