Daniel Began sold some of his property recently to a neighbor, and is to sell the remainder if he gets an encouraging offer.

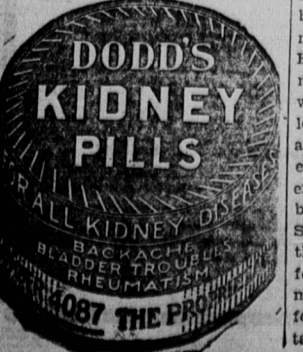
## KINGSTON NOTES
