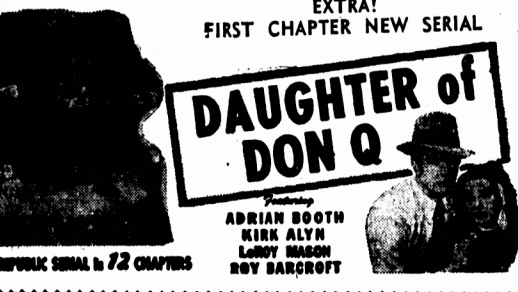

PROTESTANT ORPHANAGE HAD VERY SUCCESSFUL YEAR The January meeting of the Protestant Orphanage Trustees Board was held on Tuesday the 21st. The attendance of members from outside points, in face of difficult travelling conditions was almost complete. The chairman of the board Mr. W. A. Stewart presided and after reading and adopting of minutes and other routine business, the report of committees was presented with, since these were covering the year 1946.

The highlight of the meeting was the financial report and it showed in detail that the finances of this popular institution were in a most satisfactory condition. It was Mrs. Henderson's twelfth annual report and in comparison over the years it had no equal either in amount collected or net surplus. SHELL COLLECTION KNOWN WORLD OVER SIDNEY, B. C. Jan. 21 — (CP) — A unique hobby which began about 15 years ago with the finding of an old flintlock, has made the name of Joseph Gibeault known to ammunition manufacturers the world over. Joe Gibeault, British Columbia Provincial Police constable, lays claim to one of the largest collections of small calibre shells in Canada. The 2,700 shells in his collection range from ancient rifle shells to experimental shells not yet on the market. Each shell is catalogued and photographed to scale, and is recorded in one of the five large books in which the historical data of the individual shell is kept. Smallest shell in the collection is hardly bigger than a pin head, made to fire from a pistol about the size of a wash tub. Largest is for a 50-calibre navy revolver which Gibeault claimed is the world's largest. In shotgun shells, he has them from a four-gauge

NEW INDIA DRUG ANTI-BACTERIAL CALCUTTA, India, Jan. 22 — (CP) — A drug which is claimed to be better than penicillin has been discovered by Prof. S. R. Bose of the Calcutta Medical College. The drug is derived from pieces of decomposed wood and is the climax of Dr. Bose's experiments on wood-decaying fungi for a quarter of a century. In May, 1944, he began applying his knowledge to the study of the anti-bacterial activity of these fungi.

known as "polyporin" the drug is claimed to be especially suited for tropical countries and has been found effective in a number of major diseases such as typhoid, cholera, dysentery, carbuncles, ulcers, abscesses, troubles of the eye, ear, nose and throat.

The drug is also said to possess a degree of chemical stability which adds considerably to its usefulness. It has been found that, unlike penicillin, "polyporin" can remain in well-balanced state without being liable to mutation or disintegration. It can be stored at normal room temperature almost anywhere without any loss of potency.

It can be administered easily and does not produce any toxic effects or depression. It can be applied to open wounds or ulcers and causes no pain or irritation. Its anti-bacterial power remains unaffected by stomach contents.

Professor Bose is still engaged in further research in order to evolve a more purified and concentrated form of "polyporin."

WIFE NOT CHATTEL TELLS 1947 HUSBY LONDON, Jan. 22 — (CP) — Husbands haven't changed since Victorian days, says Reginald Pestell, secretary of the Marriage Guidance Council—and he doesn't like it.

"In Queen Victoria's time, a woman's husband was her managing director," he told a London conference of health visitors and school nurses.

"He regarded her as a chattel, and today this feeling persists. Men still believe women are on a lower plane than themselves and after marriage, expect wives to sink their personality and submerge their individuality in that of their husbands."

Women's resolve to establish equality with man will make marriage a healthier relationship ultimately, he said, but he questioned whether there is such a thing as an "ideal marriage."

Pestell said more advice on birth-control should be available to the public, and he expressed belief that social workers are the right people to give it. But one social worker had lost her job because she gave such advice against the ruling of the municipal medical officer of health—the man who has the final say.

MAKES LIONESS POULTRY GUARD PRETORIA, South Africa, Jan. 21 — (CP) — The world's most formidable "sentry" now has been installed on the farm of D. Fritz of Pretoria North, who has become desperate as a result of incessant raids on his poultry by thieves. At first he had a large dog to watch the pens of fowls, but still the valuable fowls disappeared. Then he replaced the dog with a 2-year-old lioness. The thieves haven't been back since.
