VANCOUVER WOMAN MARRIED A HINDU

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 27.—The first wedding in this country between a white woman and a Hindu occurred last Monday morning at St. James' Church. The ceremony was performed by Rev. H. C. P. Clinton, rector of the church, the bride having been for several years an attendant at that church. The bride was Mrs. Annie Wright, an attractive looking woman in the early thirties. She has a daughter nine or ten years of age. The bridegroom was Joseph Munchi-Singh. Mrs. Munchi-Singh discussed her second embarkation on the sea of matrimony with much pride, and said: "My second husband is a Hindu, who has been in British Columbia for five years. He is 26 years of age, well educated, speaks and writes English very fluently. I have known him for a long time, and he is a good man. Some of my relatives objected to the marriage, but my brother, who has lived in Vancouver for twenty years, knows my husband well, and quite approved of the match."

KEIR HARDIE AT MONTREAL

MONTREAL, Aug. 27.—Speaking last night in the Monument National on the C.P.R. strike, Mr. Keir Hardie, M. P., advised the men to hold together. "A strike is war," he said, "and in the field of the battle the man who flees and deserts his comrades is a coward and traitor; the same is true of the striker who goes back." He urged other Union men to contribute to the support of the strikers, and hinted that financial aid might come from the United States and Great Britain. If aid did not come the strikers could never resist the C. P. R. During an address of an hour, Mr. Hardie defined socialism as a movement by which law and industrial affairs of the country were to be acquired by the public and used for common good and not private ends. "Socialism," said the speaker, "is the only remedy for the present poverty and hunger of the world." Mr. Hardie leaves tomorrow on a visit to western cities.

FOUGHT FOR LIFE IN SEWER

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—Fighting desperately for life in a sewer in East Eighty-First Street, in which waters from flooded cellars poured in a furious torrent. John Lynch, a sewer department employee, with one foot wedged beneath a cellar pipe, watched the swirling waters swiftly rise to his waist, then to his throat, and then his life was blotted out. Two companions who had gone with Lynch into the narrow manhole, from the street to the sewer, to open the choked pipes, stood on the iron ladder leading into the pitchy darkness to the sewer and with sorrow saw the man engulfed in the flood had recoiled as swiftly as it rose and the body was recovered without difficulty. They did not relinquish their hold on the man's hands, however, until he ceased to struggle. An alarm was quickly sent to the Fire Department, but when the engine arrived to pump off the water, the flood had receded as swiftly as it rose and the body was recovered without difficulty.

CROP ESTIMATE NOW GOING DOWN

WIENIPEG, Man., Aug. 27.—Latest conservative estimates are inclined to put the total wheat crop at under a hundred millions, some experts placing the figure as low as eighty millions while others run up to a hundred and fifteen million bushels. It is certain that the crop will be very variable according to the district and local conditions. Southern Alberta for instance, is now freely harvesting wheat that will average twenty-five bushels and has escaped all frost damage. In some parts of Saskatchewan and Manitoba, on the other hand grain has suffered much from the prolonged drought of July and early August, which checked growth, prematurely withering the straw before the heads had well come out. Many fields thus affected will not run more than eight or ten bushels. Early frost has done damage to late grain in certain low lying localities and on heavy lands, and the total damage from this cause will be considerable, but the effect on the crop as a whole can only be ascertained as threshing returns come in from known or suspected frosted localities.

THE CANADIAN BUTTER EXPORT.

LONDON, Aug. 27.—Wedded Company's Colonial Dairy Produce Review states that the Canadian butter export in 1907 was the smallest known since 1905. Three years ago it reached the highest level 15,145 tons and last year fell to 1,862 tons. Quality again showed an improvement over the previous year and the United Kingdom and on the landing wharves here is perfectly up to date, Canadian butter bought further to improve in quality and bring higher prices in our markets. Some of inferior quality which yet comes is due to damage caused by want of proper refrigerating arrangements before it is snipped and the remainder to defects in its manufacture which are avoidable if proper care be taken. In cheese there has been a steady decrease from Canada and the United States. This decrease has given an opportunity for New Zealand to make up some of the deficiency. Imports from New Zealand have advanced in ten years from 5,870 tons to 13,152 tons. Improvement in quality continues to be shown in Canadian. Improved methods of curing and better transit arrangements in Canada have added largely to the better quality which now prevails in this article. Australia last year sent a small shipment of cheese to London, and the quality was very satisfactory. One shipment from New South Wales was of superior quality to the best Canadian, owing to it being made on the English cheddar principle and it approached very closely to the English condition of manufacture in having the milking herd close to the factory door, so that the milk was always in sweet condition when it came.

WINNIPEG MAN WON CLUB MATCH.

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 27.—The Ontario Rifle Association matches opened yesterday with good weather and a large attendance of marksmen from East and West. The first match shot was the Canadian Club, seven rounds at six hundred yards, prone, G. W. Andrews, Winnipeg, R. A. headed the list with a score of thirty-five. B. Team Royal Garrison won the team prize with 158, and Sgt. Mitchell 13th, and Sgt. Smith G. G. F. G. tied for a special prize worth \$25 given by Hiram Walker and Son, with 35 each.

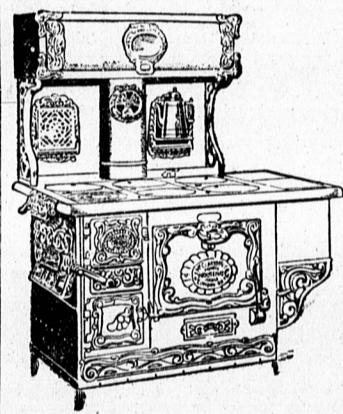

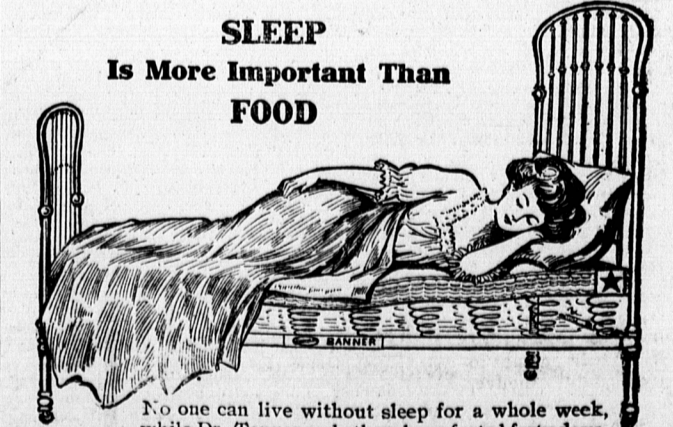
