

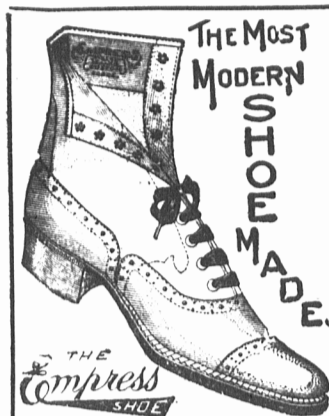

Latest from Summerside and Prince County.

The executive of the Summerside Yacht Club will hold a meeting in C. R. Rogers' office on Wednesday evening at 8 sharp. There will be business of importance and every member is urged to attend.

The Leap year skate on the 29 inst., to be given by special request in Crystal rink promises to be a pleasurable affair. No programs will be issued, and the lady will be expected to call upon the gentleman without previous engagement.

The supper given by the Y's in aid of the Y. M. C. A. in Union Hall, Friday evening was fairly well patronized. Those who attended found besides a tasteful spread of delicacies a most pleasing service by the young ladies in charge. The Y's have established for themselves a good reputation which will no doubt be much in their favor should they again hold a similar affair.

The advocates of water works and sewerage are selecting as their choice of candidates for councillors those most sincerely in favor of having a plant installed. While citizens at the annual public meeting made the request by vote that the incoming council obtain estimates and other information and by plebiscite get the views of all taxpayers on the question; and with this request the new councillors, whoever they may be, are duty bound to grant, yet those citizens who are most anxious for the system want no obstacle in the way of a fair test by the election of Councillors opposed to the installation of a water works and sewerage plant.

A New York despatch of Feb. 13, gives the following account of a hockey match between teams from Brooklyn and Montreal in which Art Williams, formerly goal of the Crystal-Pioneers of Summerside, figured conspicuously. — By one goal, scored in the last fifteen seconds of the play and shot by Hardy, the All New York hockey team defeated the visiting Montreal seven at Clearmont Ave., rink, Brooklyn last night. The game was one of the prettiest exhibitions ever seen in this city. The Canadians proved that they are masters of the finer gets of hockey playing, though they happened to take the losing end of the game. Final score was All New York two, Montreal one. The game was fast and full of pretty playing. At periods the pace set was out of the usual order in speed and due to this there were mix ups which caused two or three players to be ruled off for rough playing. Williams saved the day for the All New York team. The New York goal was essayed time and again by the Canadians, but the ever ready Williams was practically invincible. His work at defence was one of the features of an all round good game. Neither side were able to score in the first half. The visitors showed a fine style of playing and their team work was about as perfect as could be desired.

RUSSIAN ARMY AND NAVY IS SOON TO BE RE-ORGANIZED

General Kerpalsky will Command the Yalu Division which is Expected to be Attacked by the Japanese Forces in the Near Future.

NEWCHWANG, Feb. 16.—Viceroy Alexieff left Port Arthur today, proceeding to Harbin with General Pfing, the chief of staff, and the general staff.

It is said that the Russian army and navy commands will be re-organized and that General Kerpalsky will command the Yalu division, which is expected to be attacked by the Japanese forces.

Atrocities daily perpetrated both by police and troops, make it impossible for the civil administrator of Newchwang to control the situation. It is feared that a reign of terror will be precipitated if the neutral powers remain inactive. A squad of police with ten soldiers, without any provocation, destroyed the contents of a hotel, owned by a German where three Japanese had registered under the protection of the civil administrator. These Japanese were bound, stabbed and robbed

of food, money and jewelry. They were rescued with difficulty by United States Consul Miller, together with three women refugees, all of whom the civil administrator had assured Mr. Miller would be protected.

The administrator admits the gravity of the situation, but declares that Viceroy Alexieff alone can remedy it. It is believed here, however, that the maintenance of order at this treaty port and the prevention of these violations of international rights can be insured only on instant international proclamation, supported by an armed force.

Mines have been constructed and preparations made for depositing them at the mouth of the river here, where the forts have been occupied by a field battery of artillery and guns from the Russian gunboat Sivouch.

DEMAND FOR MONEY.

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 16.—The demand for Mexican dollars for the far east continues and bankers fear if the drain is not stopped the tightness of the money market will be increased.

JAPAN CAN TRAVERSE KOREA.

SEOUL, Feb. 16, The Korean government has granted Japan the right to traverse the country. It is reported that Japanese warships have trapped three Russian ships at Yongampo. No details regarding the results of this naval exploit have been received.
