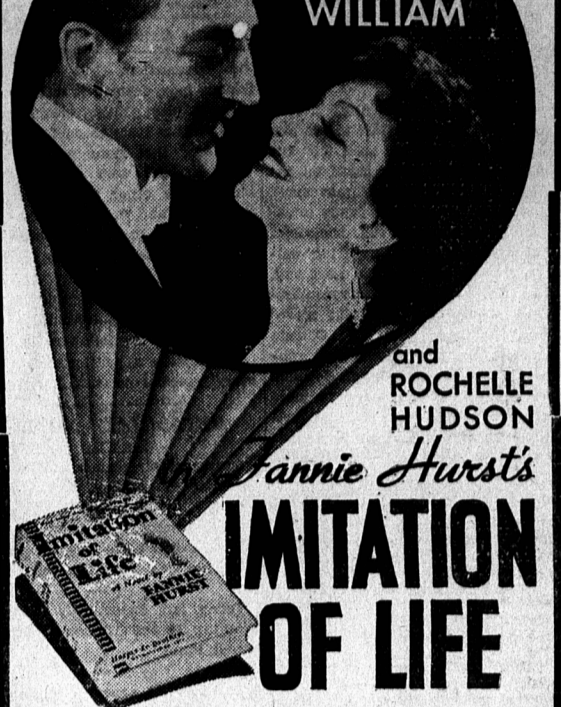
Will Attempt To Swim English Channel
