DUTIES OF AN ADJUTANT.—Somebody wants to know what the duties of an adjutant of a Canadian battalion under the present system consists of. The adjutant is the mouth-piece of the commanding officer, and all orders issued by him to any officer, of whatever rank under the authority of the O. C., must be obeyed with alacrity. He is answerable for all the orderly room work, books, returns, orders; is responsible for disciplinary and must take charge of regimental drills and the drilling of recruits and young officers. He acts as prosecutor in court-martial cases and, generally speaking, is the most important officer of a battalion next to the commanding officer.

MRS. ALBERT WOODS, KELLY'S CROSS.

The Guardian regrets to announce the passing away of Mrs. Albert Woods (formerly Miss Margaret Towle) which sad event took place on Thursday the 27th ult. at her home, Kelly's Cross. Although deceased had been in delicate health and under medical treatment for some months her family and friends indulged the hope of her recovery and none thought the end was so near. Mrs. Woods was a woman of a quiet, retiring disposition, an affectionate wife and mother, a kind friend and good neighbor and had the respect and esteem of all who knew her. Islander Receives Military Cross

The Guardian is in receipt of a copy of the Caledonian and Renfrew Press, a leading Scottish Weekly which contains a lengthy report of the presentation of the Military Cross for valor to Lieut. R. R. Anderson of the 7th Cameron Highlanders, son of Provost Anderson of Renfrew and nephew of Mrs. Andrew McNair of Charlottetown. The Military Cross was bestowed upon the gallant young officer by His Majesty King George for conspicuous gallantry in the field of battle in Flanders, for which service he was mentioned in despatches by Sir John Erench. The decoration was pinned upon the breast of Lieut. Anderson by His Majesty in person upon his return from France. The deed for which he received the decoration was performed at the battle of Loos.

MRS. (DR.) WILLIAM KIER.

In the death of Mrs. (Dr.) William Kier, which occurred Friday evening, the 5th inst., Malpeque has lost one of its most deservedly esteemed residents. FUR AUCTION SALES IN UNITED STATES

Mr. J. E. B. McCready has received the following letter from Funsten Bros. & Co., St. Louis: Dear Sir: We thank you for the report of the Fox Breeders' Sales Board. For your information, we call your attention to the fact that our house has handled more P. E. Island silver foxes in the last year than any other house or market in the world. We also have obtained the highest prices on record for silver foxes within the past year. We have written to the Sales Board calling their attention to a mis-statement in their report of the U. S. Auctions. We are sending you herewith a copy of the letter written to them. In view of the fact that St. Louis has not been investigated by the Board in question, we do not think it is fair for them to include us in the U. S. Auctions, as we are not in any sense fur dealers but are conducting fur auction sales as a service to the American and Canadian fur trade along the same lines as the auction houses in London. We do not handle these furs in our own sales for our own account, either buying or selling, but represent the shipper exclusively. We have handled in our last two auction sales, on the average, twice as many foxes as were handled by the other auction concerns. In view of the fact that St. Louis has produced the best concerns. In view of the fact that St. Louis has produced the best results on silver foxes in the last year and have handled the largest number of skins, we think it is well for the P. E. I. fox ranchers to understand these facts. We are giving you this for your information, and we again thank you for sending us the report that you did. The enclosed letter is as follows: Prince Edward Island Sales Board, Charlottetown, P. E. Island, Gentlemen: We note in an article which appeared in the New York Times that you refer to the U. S. Auctions being conducted by fur dealers who buy and sell for their own account. As there are only two auctions that we know of, viz. the one held in New York City and the one conducted by us in St. Louis, we write to take exception to your statement that fur auctions are conducted by fur dealers who are interested. We speak for ourselves when we inform you that our auctions are conducted by ourselves, who are not interested and not fur dealers. We conduct our sales on exactly the same lines as the London auction houses in so far as we are not fur dealers in any sense of the word, but
