MEETING OF THE GRAND LODGE I.O.G.T.

Continued from page 3 of our cause during his three years occupancy of the G. C. T. Chair.

(10th) In regard to the accumulation of a fund by the Grand Lodge for the purpose of making loans towards building halls in localities where Lodges could not otherwise be organized nor carried on, to which the Grand Chief Templar has called attention in his report. Your Committee would recommend that a special Committee be appointed to consider this matter and report at the next Annual Session.

(11th) Your Committee recommend that this Grand Lodge put itself on record as favoring the adoption of "The Templar," as the Official Organ for the Maritime Provinces, and request the incoming executive to procure sample copies for distribution to our Subordinate Lodges, with a view of obtaining subscriptions.

(12th) We desire to express our appreciation of the courtesy of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia in sending to our Annual gathering their Grand Treasurer, Brother Sydney Purdy, and we would convey our fraternal greetings through him to the Nova Scotia Grand Lodge. We also recommend that the executive of this Grand Lodge be authorized to send a representative to the Nova Scotia Grand Lodge at Sydney in July 1907.

(13th) Re the matter of a Canadian National Grand Lodge your Committee have not had sufficient opportunity to consider the question; therefore cannot intelligently advise any definite course of action; we would, however, recommend that our Grand Lodge Executive open up correspondence with the other Canadian Grand Lodges, with a view of obtaining information for our next Annual Session.

The Committee on condolence, consisting of Rev. L. J. Watson, A. E. Horton, Wm. McLeod and Rev. W. R. Motley submitted a nicely worded resolution regretting the death in May last of Dr. D. H. Mann, P. R. W. G. Templar, the only Right Worthy Grand Templar who had during his term of office visited this Island.

The committee on juvenile work through the chairman, Cyrus Moore, gave an encouraging report which was unanimously adopted. The election of officers resulted as follows:—

- P. G. C. T. S. Robertson, Red Point. G. C. T. Rev. A. E. McPhee, Dundas. G. Vice—Miss Addie Fraser, North Lake. G. Counselor—Cyrus Moore, Union Road, Lot 51.

Grand Master, Russell Findlay, Cambridge, the member who nominated Rev. Mr. McPhee for Grand Chief Templar gave some interesting facts as to those who had filled the chair of the Grand Lodge of P. E. Island, which was re-organized in September, 1882. J. C. Underhay was the first and he served two years. J. A. Lawson followed with two years. Mr. McRae was succeeded by L. U. Fowler, and he by Rev. W. A. Mason, each serving one year. Then came Rev. W. H. Spargo, who served two years, and Rev. Lawson Lawson one year. After Mr. Lawson, Rev. John Goldsmith was elected for two years and Martin McKinnon one year; he was followed by S. M. Martin, who was re-elected three times, making his term of four years the longest of any Chief Templar. T. S. Robertson came after Mr. Martin, being elected first in 1902. It will be seen that in the twenty-three years, twelve men have occupied the office of Grand Chief Templar. They are all living. One half are still residents of the Province.

Before the Session closed, Mr. Purdy the visitor from Nova Scotia, who had

many friends during his short visit, asked leave to retire as he had to go by train. He was given a shaking of the hand and retired hearing the whole Grand Lodge sing "For he is a jolly good fellow."

The officers were installed by L. U. Fowler, P. G. C. T. assisted by J. G. McLeod and W. H. Riley. Messrs Charles Waye, Russel Cox, and W. H. Riley were appointed a committee to confer with the Kings' Co Alliance, and other temperance men for the purpose of recommending a man for Prosecutor.

After Dundas had been selected as the next place of meeting, the Grand Lodge closed, all declaring that the meeting had been the best one held for years. A number availed themselves of the invitation of Mr. Cummins, photographer, to have a photo taken at a most beautiful place on the Montague River.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 36, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less. Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated. Entries must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated. The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years. (2) If the father or mother, if the father is deceased of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by the person residing with the father or mother. (3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands a Ottawa of intention to apply for patent. Deputy of the Minister of the Interior. N.
