NATAL AND CAPE COLONY.

We are now told the enemy have been entirely expunged from Natal, as they have been for some months driven out of Cape Colony. These conditions will enable the two British Provinces, to resume much of their normal status, and also to take stock of the losses they have suffered. We who have never endured an armed invasion, can form but an inadequate conception of what it means. During seven months past a large section of Natal, amounting at one time to about one third of the Province, was under Boer control and occupied by their armed forces. During that time the houses of loyal citizens were looted, their live stock, farm crops, and provisions seized and carried away, and their personal liberty destroyed or imperilled. They were to all intents and purposes a conquered people. The authority of the Provincial Government and the laws of the land were overthrown, and the people were wholly subjected to Boer rule administered in despotic fashion.

In a large section of northern and northwestern Cape Colony, in Griqua Land, Bechuanaland and in parts of Rhodesia, the country was in a like condition of subjugation to a rude and semi-civilized enemy. In those large portions of British South Africa trade, industry and farming operations have been paralysed, communications cut off, railways torn up and bridges destroyed, while vast armies have marched and counter-marched and deadly battles have been fought in the once peaceful abodes of industrial life. The young and middle-aged men of the Colonies have been called to take up arms for the defence of their homes, and generally speaking the South African British possessions have been subjected to the appalling waste and destruction of war. Their treasuries have been depleted and they are to-day almost bankrupt financially.

Apart from the loss and waste, the wrecks of public works that must be rebuilt and the private losses to be repaired, we must remember the great strain to which the English and Dutch sections of the population have been subjected in their relations to each other, and the increased difficulties that beset them in again taking up the work of life as a community. Yet we doubt not that they will do so, and that the healing influence of time may bring peace and concord with even greater prosperity and progress than before.

Some things have been already settled by the war, even if we were to admit that the precise future of the Dutch Republics is still in doubt. The dream of an African State with Dutch dominance in South Africa has vanished. The Africaner Bond has failed utterly in its ultimate object. British paramountcy has been asserted in South Africa in such an energetic and decisive way that we may trust it shall never again be challenged. These are gains for South Africa and for the Empire of which we are already assured. We hope very soon to be equally assured that the Dutch Republics have become British colonies, and that from the northern bounds of Rhodesia to Cape Town and Durban the British flag will float unchallenged over a population everywhere bettered by the changes that have come and reconciled to the change. This too will require the healing influence of time. Meanwhile our sympathies must go out to our fellow subjects in Natal and Cape Colony on whom the stress and burdens of the war have fallen so heavily during the past seven months.
