Disappointed At Court Decision

(C.P. by Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, April 21—"Great disappointment" was expressed here tonight by D. R. Turnbull, former president of the Maritime Transport Commission, when he heard of the Supreme Court decision dismissing an appeal from the Board of Railway Commissioners. It was a great blow to us," Turnbull said. The Maritime Provinces had appealed to the Supreme Court against a decision of the Railway Commission refusing a reduction of three cents a bushel in freight rates on carload lots of potatoes. Mr. Turnbull said he did not care to comment further until he had carefully examined the text of the Supreme Court's decision.

LONDON, April 21—Ninety five Canadian women will be presented to Their Majesties at Buckingham Palace Courts this season. The number has been increased from 85 as so many wives decided to accompany husbands who are official representatives at the Coronation. Seventy women will make their bows on the evening of May 6th, 25 on the evening of July 1. At the first court three Canadian mothers who have already been presented, are attending to present their daughters: Mrs. Douglas Cameron of Vancouver, presenting Miss Espeth Cameron; Mrs. Jonathan Rogers of Vancouver with Miss Rosemary Rogers; Mrs. Leonard Tilley, wife of Justice Tilley, former premier of New Brunswick, with her daughter, Mrs. Ronald Mears. Mrs. Vincent Massey, wife of the High Commissioner in London, will present the rest of the large group which includes: Mrs. George DeBlois, wife of the Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, and Miss Helen DeBlois; Mrs. Bradford LePage, wife of the president of the Executive Council in Prince Edward Island; Mrs. William S. Stewart, Charlottetown; Mrs. Rowland Paton, wife of the A. D. C. to the Lieutenant Governor of P. E. I.

Dutch Steamer Crew Are Safe

(A.P. by Guardian's Special Wire) AMSTERDAM, April 21—The Amsterdam Government received word tonight that officers and crew of the Dutch steamer Andra were safe. The Andra was captured two weeks ago by Spanish insurgents. The Netherlands legation at Lisbon informed the foreign office that the crew had been liberated by insurgent captors at Salamanca and that reports officers of the ship had been executed were without foundation.

(Continued from page 1) seas she will be protected by any British warship within call, if fired on or subjected to any illegal interference. But if any British merchant vessel enters Spanish territorial waters she does so at her own risk. "These conditions apply whether or not the Spanish warship is inside territorial waters." Henderson then asked if the insurgent warship was just outside territorial waters, would not this render protection of the British fleet worthless? Hoare: "No. I do not admit the right of any insurgent warship to sink or attack a British ship in circumstances of that kind within territorial waters. The utmost a hostile ship could do would be to take the other ship into possession." E. Shinwell, Labor, asked in the event of a British merchant vessel penetrating territorial waters and then being damaged as the result of an insurgent action, who would be held responsible? Hoare: "We have already drawn attention of General Francisco Franco (insurgent leader) to the risks involved in that way and we have said that any damage would be without prejudice to further claims that might be made." Shinwell then asked: "Does that mean that if a British merchant vessel not in territorial waters is damaged by an action for which insurgents are responsible, the Government will call upon Franco to compensate the owners for that damage?" Hoare: "Yes. We have already told Franco he would be responsible for any claims which might be made in either contingency."

(Continued from page 1) advantages in rates given thereby to persons and industries located in the select territory." Under the Maritime Freight Rates Act, approved by parliament in 1927, certain movements of freight originating in the Maritimes are given a 20-per-cent rate reduction while travelling over lines in the eastern railroad division. The preferred movements are local shipments, freight destined to Canadian points outside the Maritimes and freight going overseas. Section eight empowers the Board to disallow tariffs prejudicing that advantage.

Agree With Findings The Supreme Court agreed with the finding of the Board that freight rates outside the select zone are within the contemplation of section eight and that Maritime shippers are entitled to have their rates lowered to meet reductions in other parts of the country when the latter are prejudicial to the 20-per-cent advantage.

The Maritime interests and the railways were in dispute as to what evidence should be adduced to prove prejudice. The Maritimes said the mere showing of reductions in rates outside the select territory, coupled with evidence that similar goods were shipped out of the Maritimes was sufficient to demonstrate prejudice. The Board held with the railways that positive proof must be shown that Maritime shippers had actually been prejudiced in any such case.

The Board found the evidence of prejudice insufficient in respect of potatoes. It held only a comparatively small quantity of potatoes moved from Ontario points to Toronto under the rate cut there compared with the volume of shipments to that city from the Maritimes. Therefore the deduction was drawn the Maritimes shippers had not been prejudiced in fact.

Although the Supreme Court held it was a question of fact for the Board to decide, the judges said this did not mean the onus was on the applicants to prove prejudice. Only potato rates were involved in the appeal but it was regarded as a test case affecting a large number of other commodities in which rates have been reduced outside the select territory.
