Mr. Jerome Pineau, of New Acadia, has received the following letter from his son, John, who was wounded and is now in an English hospital:

Dear Father and Mother.—Just a few lines to let you know that I am getting along fine. The wound on my leg is healing well. How is every body home? It is getting very warm over here now, as summer came all at once.

I was to Sheffield yesterday and it is a very nice place. You can see lots of people working the land as the city people have a little plot of land to plant potatoes in about one mile from Sheffield. I suppose you are busy putting in the crop. I hope you had a good spring, but I suppose it is like this country, late. Who is teaching school in New Acadia this year? I suppose Jerry can do a lot of work on the farm, and I suppose he is as big as a man. Did you hear from Joe lately? They are very good to me boys in the hospital, but they stick to the old fable, "early to bed and early to rise." We get up at six o'clock and go to bed at nine. We are allowed to go everywhere we like in the afternoon, but we have to stay around the hospital in the forenoon. We have a nice recreation room, where they have billiard tables and a piano, and all kinds of books to read. The matron treats us to a theatre once a week, and we often go for a ride in an auto; so you see we have a very good time. As for smokes we get all kinds, for you see I got the habit over in France. I think everybody smokes over there for it is about the only thing to do.

Well, dear mother, I haven't much news to tell you now. I will bring my letter to a close by wishing you best of luck.

CIRCULAR TO THE NATIONAL LEAGUE

The following letter has been sent by the Director of National Service, Hon. J. A. McDonald, to all the Branch Leagues throughout the province:

As you are aware, the objects of our Organization on broad and general lines are. First, to do all that lies within our power to assist in bringing the war to a successful issue; and, second, to prepare as far as we possibly can to meet the changed conditions which will face the country on the conclusion of peace.

That we may be in a position to intelligently consider the many problems arising out of the present unprecedented situation, it is essential that some method of co-ordinating our best thought, and stimulating to the utmost our latent energy, should be devised in order that co-operative preparation may put us in a position to successfully overcome the difficulties which lie before us. Hence it was deemed advisable to initiate this movement, the result of which is a practically complete organization of the province into branches of the League—all prepared to give NATIONAL SERVICE in any form required.

From time to time it is proposed to appeal to the units of this organization to take up definite work in connection with National Service objects, and at all times you are asked to give thought to present conditions in general and suggest how, in your opinion, these conditions may be most effectively dealt with. This you can best accomplish by meeting together frequently, discussing your local problems and their relation to the main interests involved, endeavoring to realize the magnitude of the responsibility resting upon each and every individual at this time, and doing all you can, as a body, to impress your neighbors with the gravity of the situation.

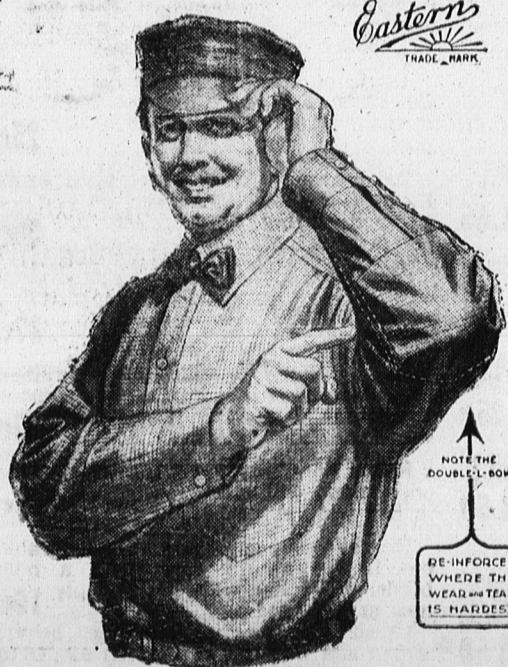
