New Version Of Old Adage, Swords Into Plow Shares

(By The Canadian Press) MEDICINE HAT, Alta., Aug. 7 - They've got a new version of the old adage about beating swords into plow shares at the Suffield Experimental Station, 30 miles northwest of here. They are switching from flame throwers to spray guns. It's part of the conversion of the wartime testing base from research in chemical warfare to other projects including the use of chemicals in combating Prairie insect pests - grasshoppers, black flies, mosquitoes and warble flies. Operations of the base were top secret during the war when it became the largest test station devoted to chemical warfare and allied fields in the democracies. NEW YORK, Aug. 7 (AP) - The Ecuador earthquakes Friday, in which the death toll may exceed 4,600 is South America's worst tragedy of this kind since 1939. In that year, 30,000 were killed in earthquakes in Chile. Only other recent quakes on the southern continent were last April when 44 were killed in South Central Chile, and in November, 1947, when 60 were killed in Central Peru. Other major earthquake catastrophes of the last two decades: 1948 - 3,238 killed at Fukui, Japan; more than 1,000 killed at Lihwa, Sikang Province, China. 1939 - Erzincan, Turkey, 23,000 killed. 1935 - Quetta, India, 60,000 killed. 1934 - India, more than 6,000 killed. 1933 - Honshu Island, Japan, 1,538 dead. 1932 - Kansu, China, 70,000 killed. 1931 - Managua, Nicaragua, 1,000 killed. 1930 - Southern Italy, 1,404 killed. The greatest toll of lives taken by earthquakes this century was in 1920, at Kansu, China, when 180,000 were killed.

Toronto Police Continue To Seek Slayers

TORONTO, Aug. 7 (CP) - Baffled by misleading reports and lack of clues in the double-gun-slaying of Robert and Gloria McKay, police investigators said today they are following up several new leads. One is the finding of Heige A. Lemmell, believed to have been one of the last persons to see the McKays alive. He was picked up by police on a Barrie farm Saturday for questioning. The popular young couple were two of six slaying victims in the Toronto district within nine days - unprecedented in Toronto crime history. McKay's body, shot three times, was found in a suburban North York gully last Tuesday. His wife's body, with two bullet wounds, was discovered the following day in a parked car at a former military hospital parking lot. They were buried Saturday. Lemmell, 35-year-old Swedish farm laborer and object of a 24-hour police search, is known to have accompanied the McKays in their car for a few miles when they motored homeward last Monday from a week-end at their uncle's farm where Lemmell was employed. Police said the farm worker is not a suspect in the slayings. Police reported there are no new developments in the case of Alfred Layng, 26, shot and killed while attempting to capture a gunman escaping from an East-Central grocery store a week ago. The reward for the capture of his slayer was increased to \$3,500 Saturday. The McKay slayer has a \$5,000 reward to his heirs. Victims of other slayings in the Toronto area were Douglas each case.
