Presentations Are Made To Rev. A. D. MacKenzie

Record attendances featured the morning and evening services at Knox United Church when Rev. A. D. MacKenzie, acting minister, preached his closing sermon before leaving for the coast this morning. As a tangible token of the high esteem in which Mr. MacKenzie is held by the congregation and in appreciation of the valued services he rendered to the church in all departments since he came to Regina last September, James Grassick, on behalf of the congregation, presented Mr. MacKenzie with a cheque for \$400.

The presentation was made at a meeting in the school room following the evening service. Jas. Balfour presiding over a crowded attendance. The chairman expressed the regret felt by the congregation at the departure of Mr. MacKenzie and paid a glowing tribute to the effectiveness of his work.

Miss Bryan stated that Mr. MacKenzie came to Regina as an unknown quantity, but he had proved himself far above the average preacher of the gospel. He had an uncanny faculty of reaching the hearts of the people. They all wished him unbounded success in the new work he was undertaking.

In making the presentation Mr. Grassick said they would remember Mr. MacKenzie for many long years while Mr. MacKenzie would always have a soft place in his heart for Knox and Regina. The friends of Knox did not want to burden Mr. MacKenzie unnecessarily and therefore the presentation took the form of a check with part of which they hoped he would procure something for his new home to remind him of Knox and Regina.

Miss Bryan on behalf of a number of friends in the congregation who wished to thank Mr. MacKenzie for the spiritual help presented Mr. MacKenzie with a parcel containing \$100 in gold for Mrs. MacKenzie and her daughters, Jean and Mary. Miss Cowan said: "We are proud to have you among us."

Mr. MacKenzie in reply said he was overwhelmed with the kindness shown to him. The whole life of Knox congregation had impressed him in a way that he would never forget. He had been given a new confidence and strength for the untold work he lay before him. He undertook to invest part of the presentation cheque as requested in an enduring memorial in his home to remind him of the good days spent in Knox.

Mr. MacKenzie leaves for Vancouver this morning on "Imperial Limited" and from the coast will motor through the United States to Stanstead College, Quebec of which he has been appointed principal. He assumes his new duties July 1. In July and August he will go to Harvard to specialize in education as a preparation for his work at Stanstead and in the meantime he will fulfil preaching engagements at Everett and Boston in the United States.

GREAT BRITISH PREACHERS TO VISIT SACKVILLE, N. B.

Dr. F. W. Norwood of the City Temple, London, England, one of the world's foremost preachers, is announced for a Christian Workers' Conference in Sackville, New Brunswick, from August 18th-25th. From the "Great White Pulpit" as it has been known since the famous days of Dr. Joseph Parker, no voice has gripped the multitudes like that of Dr. Norwood, and his visit to the Maritimes is anticipated with the greatest interest.

With Dr. Norwood will be associated Dr. Wm. C. Poole, the President of the World's Sunday School Association, another great pulpiteer of Old London, and the Rev. Tom Sykes, the valiant champion of the oppressed. Mr. Sykes lived his early life in the tiny cottage of a laborer and still lives in a quiet little village home in Yorkshire, but his voice has been eagerly listened to by the foremost men of the Empire in times of international perplexities. A large number of laymen and ministers in the Maritime Provinces are co-operating to make the Conference a success.

TORONTO, May 28—The silence of Jewish women in the Synagogue, strictly observed by the daughters of Israel since the time of Moses, may be broken for the first time in the city of Toronto if members of the Holy Blossom Synagogue carry out their intentions expressed at a meeting last night when the question of the entrance of Jewish women in the Synagogue was discussed. While there was no opposition to the proposal to give women the franchise, it was decided to leave the matter over for the annual meeting of the synagogue in September next.
