P. E. I. Highlanders Sweep Through St. Mary's C.O.T.C. For 5-0 Victory

HALIFAX, Nov. 11—(CP)—Prince Edward Island Highlanders today swept through a highly-touted St. Mary's C.O.T.C. fifteen for a 5-0 victory in a dull game at the Stedley Grounds. Still feeling the effects of the drubbing they absorbed from Dalhousie last Saturday, the collegians failed to click with their well rehearsed plays, losing many scoring opportunities through over-anxiousness.

"Piddler" MacDonald and full-back Pillitter were standouts for the Highlanders. Pillitter's long punts time and time again breaking up dangerous St. Mary's attacks.

Taking the initiative from the opening whistle the Islanders early threatened to score, sweeping to the Saints goal line only to be foiled by the clever work of full-back Wally Foley.

Following a scoreless first half Pillitter and Foley featured the final game with a spectacular punting duel till the dying moments of the game when the soldiers grabbed the ball at the Saints 20 yard line, and on a smooth working play saw "Piddler" MacDonald cross the line. Pillitter converted making the score 5-0.

Says He "Can Pitch Dodgers To Pennant"

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 1—(AP)—Warner Kirby Higbe, youthful right-handed pitcher who was sold to Brooklyn by the Phils today, believes he can pitch the Dodgers to a pennant.

High, whose home is at Columbia, N.C., visited Philadelphia during the week-end and in an interview discussed rumors he might be traded to Brooklyn.

"I ought to win 20 games at least with lighter defence and better hitting," he said.

High won 14 games and lost 19 with the Phils. Many of the games he lost were by one-run margins.

"I shall ask MacPhail (Larry MacPhail, general manager of the Dodgers) for \$15,000 salary and I feel I will get it," Higbe declared. His salary with the Phils was reported to be \$6,500.

Dodgers Trade Three Players

NEW YORK, Nov. 11—(AP)—There was a new note of exuberance tonight in Brooklyn baseball fan's personal chant: "Wait until next year! What could stop their Dodgers now with Kirby Higbe added to a team that finished second in the National League in 1940 and second only a 20-game winner to finish first?"

Larry MacPhail, club president, announced today he has acquired Higbe, a great pitcher with a fast pace club, from the Phils in exchange for pitchers Vito Tamulis and Bill Crouch and catcher Thompson Livingston, plus a little matter of \$100,000.

"We paid plenty, but it was a 'must' deal from our standpoint," said MacPhail. "Our greatest need was a top-flight pitcher—a 20-winner—and a young fellow with great stuff who could stand hard work. Higbe was the only fellow who met the specifications. We had to outbid other clubs, but we were successful because we had the money and the players."

Graboski Gets Chance Against Maple Leafs

MONTREAL, Nov. 11—(CP)—Tony Graboski, defence rookie from Sydney Millionaires, will get his first chance to show his stuff in a National Hockey League game when he swings into action against Toronto Maple Leafs here Thursday night.

Graboski, on the bench during Montreal Canadiens first two games this season, will be pressed into service to replace the injured Alex Singbush, former New Haven rear-guard whose play has been one of the surprises of the year's schedule. Singbush hurt his left shoulder as Canadians were losing to Chicago Black Hawks Sunday night and his moving he couldn't raise his arm above his shoulder.

Caledonia And Dalhousie Play To 3-all Draw

HALIFAX, Nov. 11—(CP)—The powerhouse of Caledonia retained the McTier Cup today but the moral victory in the battle for the trophy emblematic of English rugby supremacy in Eastern Canada went to the Dalhousie University team that held them to a 3-3 tie.

All the scoring came in the last five minutes of play. Caledonia took advantage of a flaw in the Dalhousie defence to push over for a try only to see Bus Phillips boot a penalty goal that squared things.

LONDON, Nov. 11—(CP)—The supply ministry had announced that salvages figures for August show 213,631 pounds (\$1,391,007) worth of useful materials was recovered and returned to industry through local authorities alone. This is the highest amount yet recorded since the salvage drive began last November. The "bag" included more than 38,600 tons of metal and nearly 1,000 tons of bone.

Scotty Wright Leading Scorer

TORONTO, Nov. 11—(CP)—George (Scotty) Wright of Hamilton Tigers, a home-brew veteran of 26, is the East's leading football scorer for 1940.

Wright wound up the regular eastern schedule with 21 points, from two field goals, 12 singles and three converts, to edge out Ottawa's Andy Tommy for first place in the Canadian Press summary.

Tommy formerly of Woodstock, N.B., nearly caught up with Hamilton's star punter in Saturday's game against the Tigers, catching a field goal and single against Toronto Argonauts, finished third with 17 points.

Two Views Presented On College Football

NEW YORK, Nov. 11—(AP)—Two diametrically-opposed views on the future of college football in the United States were presented at today's luncheon of the New York Football Writers Association.

Chick Mehan, introduced as a "coach emeritus" and speaking strictly on his own, insisted it is high time eastern colleges realize football is big business and accept manager of athletics at Princeton, predicted the probable curtailment of intercollegiate competition but with athletics surviving on a "sports for all" or largely intramural basis.

Howe Leads In First Week

MONTREAL, Nov. 11—(CP)—Syd Howe of Detroit led National Hockey League marksmen with four scoring points during the opening week of the season, according to statistics released by the N.H.L. here today.

Howe, with one goal and three assists, was one point better than Gordon Drillon of Toronto Maple Leafs and Bryan Hextall of New York Rangers. Drillon scored two goals and one assist and Hextall one goal and two assists.

The Red Wings, who played one game more than any other team in the league were tied for leadership with New York Rangers, each with three points. All other teams played two games during the week, except Boston Bruins who played only one.

Most penalized players in the circuit were Sid Abel of Detroit, Walter (Babe) Pratt of Rangers, and Bingo Kampman of Toronto, each with six minutes off the ice.

High Schools Battle To Two Draws

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Nov. 11—(CP)—The Fredericton and Saint John High School rugby teams have been unable to break a deadlock in two games, so the 1940 New Brunswick Interscholastic title will be held jointly by both squads.

The teams played a 5-5 tie at Fredericton Saturday and fought to a scoreless draw here today.

Victorias Lose 4-2 Decision To Glace Bay

GLACE BAY, N.S., Nov. 11—(CP)—Two last-period goals gave Glace Bay Miners a 4-2 victory over North Sydney Victorias tonight and enabled the Miners to consolidate their second place in the Cape Breton Hockey League.

Playing coach Jo-Jo Graboski put away the winning goal, and Boote Baird from Hamilton, Ont., made the game safe for Glace Bay with another one late in the period. Vic Hanzbury of South Point, Sudbury, Ont., got the others on in the first and one in the second.

The Williams of Charlottetown and Jimmy Russell of Hamilton got North Sydney's goals, Williams opening the V's scoring in the second period and Russell getting the equalizer in the third.
