La Paloma was turned over to Clare Wolverson as a two-year-old in 1921 and after careful training she started on her great career in 1922. She was the fastest mare in the world in 1924 of 2:01 3-4. Wolverson sold her then and she continued racing in the east. Later on she was bought by the late Mr. J. H. Adams and she was bred to the breeding ranks, predicting that she would be a great producer of champions. Her record in the above record will show. It was a case of a horseman's dream coming true.

Clare Wolverson will be remembered by Maritimers as the man who gave the first lessons to Frank Patch 204 1-4, that passed into the ownership of Alderman Frank Adams and was for several years champion pacer of the Maritimes.
