UNSTAMPED CHEQUES.—The obligations in connection with war stamps are either not generally understood or are being purposely evaded. Several fines have already been imposed in other cities for this offence and it may be necessary to adopt similar measures here.

MANXLAND'S FLIGHT.

The utter failure of the Isle of Man holiday season has disastrously affected the majority of the islanders, who depend upon holiday makers for their livelihood. There is a strong feeling in the towns and villages that the Manx Government proposal to grant £50,000 to be advanced in loans to distressed boarding-house keepers, will be altogether insufficient to cope with the situation, and a movement is on foot to secure payment of two-thirds of the local rates out of public funds and to obtain a grant from the Imperial Government.—London Exchange.
