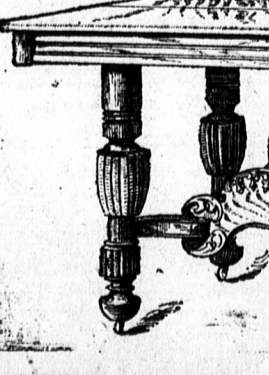

A WINTER STEAMER "RETURN."

In a return to an order of the House of Commons moved for by Mr. Martin we have copies of the correspondence with regard to the movements of the winter steamers during the early part of the present season, including the removal of the boats to Georgetown, their return here and the second removal later. It may be of some interest to follow this correspondence in outline.

On December 2 Deputy Minister Gourdeau instructed Mr. Lord, the agent of the Department here by wire that the Minto should take up the service when the Northumberland stopped, the Stanley also to be put on this route when ready, both boats to be kept together and ply from Georgetown later in the season. A letter of the same date from Mr. Gourdeau to Mr. Lord, refers to "your recommendation to keep the two boats together" and says the two boats will be allowed to run on the Charlottetown route so long as it is safe and from Georgetown to Pictou when the first-named route becomes unsafe.

This was all till the 8th of January. On that date Mr. Lord wired the Deputy Minister that the Charlottetown route had been abandoned by the captains; the Board of Trade wired to the Minister of Marine its strong protest against the boats being withdrawn from this port without notice and without any reason, stated there was strong indignation over the matter and asked for information. Then Inspector Whear on the same day wired B. M. Armstrong, Controller of the mail service, asking at what hour he would start the special trains to Georgetown, and Mr. Armstrong wired back to make no change. On January 9 Mr. Gourdeau wired Mr. Miller of the Board of Trade that the captains were instructed to use their own judgement when to leave Charlottetown "and they decided it was necessary to do so yesterday."

On the same day Messrs Warburton and Prowse wired to Minister Brodeur that the boats were taken away the weather warm, harbor open, ferry boats running, great complaints could not the steamers be continued on this route longer? After two days delay Minister Brodeur replied by wire on January 11 that the department had full confidence in the captains, left all to their discretion and they had decided it was unsafe to come to Charlottetown.

But the boats mysteriously came back, though it appears neither the Minister nor the Deputy Minister knew of the fact, for on January 14 Mr. Lord wired to the Deputy Minister: "Minto and Stanley on Charlottetown, Pictou route since eleventh; weather moderate." This seems to have puzzled the Department and on the following day, January 15, Mr. Gourdeau telegraphed Mr. Lord: "Wire immediately movements winter steamers." And the same day Mr. Lord wired to Mr. Gourdeau: "Stanley went to Georgetown from Pictou today,

Minto goes tomorrow, Charlottetown route abandoned."

The post office officials had also exchanged messages while these lightning changes were in progress: On January 14 Mr. Whear wired Mr. Armstrong: "Minto came back to Charlottetown Saturday and Stanley yesterday."

On the following day, January 15 Mr. Whear wired Mr. Armstrong again: "Two steamers again transferred to Georgetown-Pictou route, beginning today."

Surely the system which produces so much confusion, delay, repeated changes, loss and cost to shippers might be improved in some way.

And yet, largely owing to a season of unexampled mildness, we have this season had the most regular and satisfactory service in many years. It is also recorded with pleasure that there has been none of the old-time troubles as to mail trains connecting with the steamers. The railway and postal services are working in apparent harmony.

THE PATRIOT AND THE SCHOOLS.

The Patriot, whose editor is a member of the City School Board says that body has done everything in its power to safeguard the children and that "conditions are infinitely better than they were."

Let us see what has been done. Fire drill has been started. That is an old story, and may mean much or little for safety according to the emergency. The boiler rooms have also been made safe, we are told. And that is about all. Who said that the boiler rooms were unsafe?

But what of the fire escapes? There is \$600 in the estimates for this year we are told. But even The Patriot questions the utility of these. That is not encouraging as to the money being expended for the purpose.

Not a word about the inward-opening doors, the narrow exits, the narrow crooked stairs, the absence of any system of fire alarm, or fire hose, or ladders or telephone. These are the real dangers. If a fire broke out, how would the principal and teachers be notified? How would the fire department be summoned?

In the light of The Patriot's defence of the School Board, and its slurring over the real dangers there is an indictment of the Board for negligence. The reader of so lame a defence must see that the use of the words "fire traps" is painfully justified.

Mr. Wright, the Liberal member for Renfrew Ont., who recently spoke in favor of the Tunnel has made notable progress in his views in regard to that great work. Some three years ago he spoke on the subject of island grievances and the only remedy he had to propose was to
