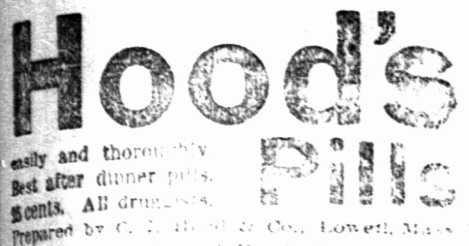

Mrs. Lemuel Frizzle, Highfield, exhibited at this office yesterday a number of luscious ripe strawberries of the white variety and taken fresh from the stem. Mrs. Frizzle received the seed from John Lewis Childs, seedsman, New York. The seeds were planted in June and blossomed in October. During the last two or three weeks the plants were kept in-doors and ripened in the sunlight. The yield was large for the first season, and the berries were of choice flavor.

THE wreck of the steamship Moberg causes a loss to the marine underwriters of £192,000. The steamer was valued at £140,000 and insured for £112,000, and is now a total wreck. The cargo was insured for £80,000.

THE shipments of potatoes and oats from this port are small. For the former 25 cents a bushel is paid and for the latter 30 cents. Considerable pork is being shipped the price paid being five cents. Live hogs sell for four cents per pound. The price of butter is somewhat firmer though in tubs it can still be bought for 14 cts. Eggs are 13 cts.

THE steamer Lake Winnipeg arrived in port last night en route from Montreal to Liverpool. She will sail tomorrow morning. Her freight will include the following: 1,000 sheep, 100 head cattle, 20 horses, 5,000 boxes cheese, 1,500 packages butter, 300 bbls apples, 50 boxes apples, 800 cases lobsters and berries.

At a meeting of the Evangelical Alliance, yesterday morning it was resolved on motion of Rev. G. O. Gates, seconded by Rev. G. W. Fisher, that the Dominion government be called upon to enforce prohibition without any reference to the provinces. After adjournment of the alliance the ministers informally discussed the formation of a law and order league, to aid in preserving the sanctity of the Sabbath. The matter will be more fully dealt with at a public meeting of citizens.—St. John Sun.

Mrs. ROBERT MCKENZIE of South Granville, died last Sabbath morning, 6th inst., of inflammation and heart trouble. The funeral took place on Monday, 7th inst. There was a large attendance. The service was conducted by Rev. Alex. Stirling. A family of nine are left to mourn the loss of a loving mother, having also a fresh remembrance of the loss of their father, who died last March. Four of the girls of the family are married, two in Massachusetts, one in Nova Scotia and one on the Island. The other members of the family, two girls and three boys, are at home occasionally.

THANKS to the Fruit Growers' Association and largely to Senator Ferguson, one of its most active members, an experimental shipment of apples is to be made to-day in cold storage, direct to Liverpool. The shipment consist of between 200 and 300 barrels. The fruit has been carefully selected and packed and includes specimens of the leading varieties. The apples were inspected on the wharf yesterday by Governor Howland, Premier Farquharson, Mayor Warburton, Senator McDonald and a number of the other most prominent men of the city, many of whom have taken a deep interest in horticulture in this province. They were greatly pleased with the appearance of the fruit, the excellence of which, it is believed, will inaugurate a lucrative export trade from the province to England.

Wedding at Cameron.

(Elmira N. Y. Star, Nov. 3rd.) To-day at twelve o'clock noon, at Cameron, N. Y., were married Miss Francis May Annabel, formerly of Elmira, and Mr. Ernest W. Macready, of the editorial staff of the New York Herald. Miss Annabel is well known in Elmira, and was a graduate of the well remembered college for young ladies in Elmira. Mr. Macready has had exciting experiences, especially during the war with Spain and events preceding it. He was on the filibuster boat "Three Friends," when it was chased by a Spanish gunboat, and when Cervera's fleet was destroyed. Mr. Macready happened to have left the Herald dispatch boat and was at the time on the battleship Texas, having gone aboard to interview the Captain. The well remembered first exclusive account of the battle appeared in the Herald and was cabled by the young gentleman who was married at 12 o'clock to-day. Mr. and Mrs. Macready will live at 101st street and Central Park, after a short wedding trip.
