MRS. JOHN J. MACDONALD.

Fortified by the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church, there passed to her eternal reward on Tuesday, Feb. 12th, 1929, Catherine, widow of the late John J. Macdonald, of Orwell Cove, at the advanced age of 84 years.

The deceased was a daughter of the late John and Mary Macdonald of Allisary, and niece of the Rt. Rev. Bernard Donald Macdonald, second Bishop of Charlottetown, and of the very Rev. Monsignor James Macdonald.

Her life was an exemplary one in many ways, by her plety and conscientious devotion to duty.

Although in delicate health for the last few months, she was able to be up as usual until two days before her death, when she gradually weakened and passed peacefully away in the presence of her son, Rev. C. J. Macdonald and the other members of her family.

Mrs. Macdonald was the mother of eleven children, two of whom died in early childhood, the other nine who were present at her funeral, are: John J., of Boston; Bernard D., of Orwell Cove; (Minnie) Mrs. Jas. MacCormack, Vernon; (Eva) Mrs. D. A. MacEachern, of Hermitage; Ellen, on the homestead; Allan B., of Orwell; James E., on the homestead; Rev. C. J., pastor of St. George's, P. E. I.; and Penzie, of Charlottetown. The funeral to Vernon River was one of the largest on record, showing the esteem in which the deceased lady was held. Solemn High Mass of Requiem was chanted by her son, Rev. C. J. Macdonald, as celebrant, and Rev. Joseph Rooney of Mirreil, as Deacon, and Rev. Owen Kiggins of Georgetown, as Sub-deacon. Rev. M. J. C. N. R. Earnings

MONTREAL, Feb. 28.—An official statement of earnings and expenses of the Canadian National Railways for the year 1928 was issued Saturday at the headquarters here. Exclusive of the lines east of Lewis and Diamond Junction and those in Central Vermont, the Canadian National Railways had gross earnings in 1928 of \$276,631,921.22. This total compares with gross earnings in 1927 of \$248,716,374.40 showing an increase in gross earnings during 1928 of \$27,915,546.82 or 11.22 percent over the previous year.

During the five months of 1928 working expenses for the National system amounted to \$218,48,343.68 as compared with a total of 203,315,684.29 during 1927, an increase of \$14,923,659.39 or 7.34 per cent.

As a result of the net earnings of the National system for the year 1928 reached a total of \$58,383,577.54 as against net earnings in 1927 of \$45,400,650.11 an increase during 1928 of \$12,982,927.43 equivalent to 28.60 per cent.

The operating ratio of the system during 1928 was reduced to 78.89 percent in comparison with 81.75 percent for 1927.

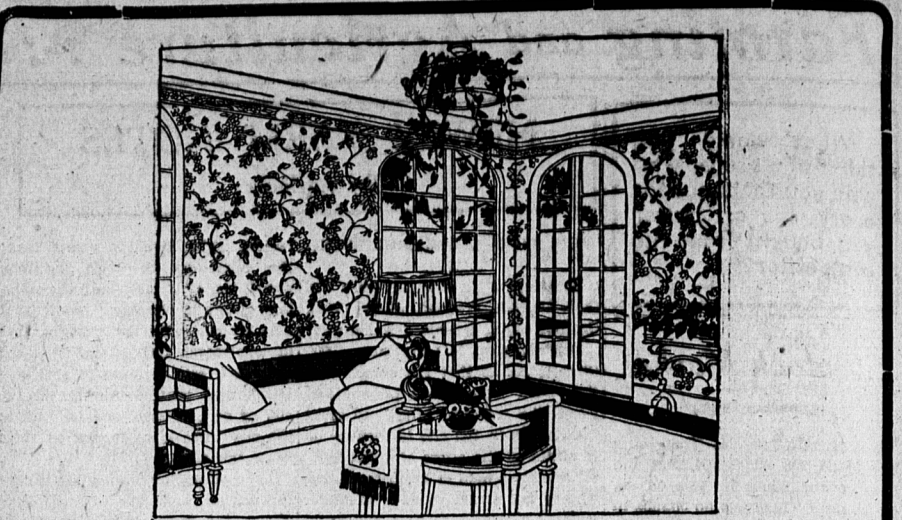
