WHEAT CLEARANCES

OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—(CP)—The Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today overseas export clearances of Canadian wheat totalled 1,424,769 bushels in the week ended Oct. 18 compared with 1,336,664 in the corresponding week last year. Exports for the 11 weeks ended Oct. 18 totalled 19,224,699 bushels compared with 26,647,385 in the same period the previous crop year.

MR. ANDREW GASS

As daylight faded away on Sunday evening, September 1st, so also did the life of Andrew Gass, 78 years old resident of Cornwall, after being confined to bed for two weeks, although in failing health for the past two years.

While in his teens, he served his apprenticeship in carpentry and spent many of his younger years at this work in Boston, Mass., later he associated his trade with farming but with the passing of years he gradually turned more to the latter occupation.

He was twice married. His deceased wife, Euphemia MacPhee, of Riverdale survived. When a young man, he married Catherine Gordon of Appin Road, who died while in her early womanhood, also seven of his children predeceased him. Three sons served overseas during 1914-18. Pie. Andrew was killed in action. Pie. Robert was twice wounded also gassed, from the effects of which he died in 1924. Pie. William was severely wounded, serving with the 2nd Battery now in England.

All this sacrifice, loss and suffering of loved ones, naturally caused him much sorrow, the extent of which only those in the home could fully realize, however this mental suffering no doubt took its toll and helped to cause a breakdown in health, but, it can be truly said that he endured his Cross of grief and sacrifice in silence, as a reward may he receive the mercy of the Lord.

Dr. Chase's Nerve Food

White Doctor Carries on Under Fire, Defies Japs at Bayonet Point, Makes Pals of China's Toughest Warriors



The only white man who ever lived and travelled with Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's famed 8th Route Army is Dr. Robert Brown (LEFT), medical missionary in West China for 23 years. Dr. Brown's mission is at Yulu on the Yangtze river, now occupied by the Japanese. This picture (SECOND LEFT), taken by Dr. Brown, shows the International Dispensary Co. building, only its front wall left standing after a Japanese air attack. Like the Nazis, the Nipponese believe in "selecting" war by indiscriminate bombing of undefended towns. Behind the bombers came Japanese troops, and in the wreckage-struck streets (SECOND RIGHT) of Wuhu, Dr. Brown counted the bodies of 17 civilians in a short drive one day. Citizens were killed in the street for no reason but straight terrorism, he said. In the mission he gave sanctuary to as many as 3,000 Chinese women at one time, as Jap soldiers looted and pillaged. Gathered around a dud bomb which fell in Mrs. Brown's garden are Mrs. Brown and some of the mission staff (RIGHT). Mrs. Brown is the white woman at LEFT. When the Japanese troops entered the mission grounds one day and demanded at the bayonet point that women refugees be surrendered, Dr. Brown stood them off for two hours and finally "outbluffed" them, he says.
