## DETERIORATION IN NEW ENGLAND

Discussed by an Islander Now in Massachusetts

Moral Degeneracy Due to Selfishness, Stimulated by Unitarianism—Some Single Tax Observations.

(Sunday Journal)

This is to add another voice to that of the writers in the Atlantic Monthly, who a few years ago gave such a dark though none the less true, picture of the degeneracy of character and immorality of life of rural New England. If people were not prepared for the truth then they are amply prepared for it now, as seen from the acquiescent manner in which the same dark story of degeneracy, as told by the late Rev. H. L. Hutchins, has recently been repeated.

The present acquiescence would seem to indicate that when readers of the Atlantic were shocked by what they read they began to seek the truth for themselves, and then they must have been shocked indeed.

But the conviction that evil exists, while very important as one of the first essentials toward its eradication, is not sufficient.

We must diligently seek for the causes of the evil and endeavor to find effective and lasting remedies, and then, with all the strength and perseverance and faithfulness of our best manhood, apply these remedies for the uplifting of our country—the regeneration of New England to its first purity.

Now with regard to this moral degeneracy—luxury of the marriage relation, the low standard of public opinion, indifference to the general violation of law, property and virtue, in short, the whole miserable condition as it stands, to what is it due? As one who has been for 20 years a close observer, brought by my business into intimate association with the family life throughout the length and breadth of New England, I have no hesitation in saying that the present pitiable conditions are owing primarily and fundamentally and supremely, to that great enemy of all true national progress—to individual selfishness.

The young man in the New England family is trained, not for citizenship in the broader sense, but for the making of money—to advance the self in worldly affairs. He is taught to succeed, that is, to get rich—win, by fair means, if possible, but to win, he is taught that he cannot afford to. He is taught that he cannot afford to marry. The young woman of wealthy parents is not disposed, and in many cases is not allowed to marry the man who cannot support her as her father does. The young business, working or professional woman is not willing to give up her salary and attempt to get house and possibly to bring up a family upon the salary of a man who earns little more than she now spends upon herself.

There is universal selfishness, and to what is it due? Incredible as it may seem, one of the greatest sources of it is the teaching of the Unitarian Church, which within recent years has assumed so prominent a place in the popular imagination. In the very nature of things, a doctrine which ignores the atonement, our one example of perfect self-sacrifice, upon which rests the salvation of the world, is even unconsciously teaching selfishness. It is the assering of self, the right of the individual to think and act for his own best interest, the desire to get rich, permeating through all ranks and walks of life, which to a great extent accounts for the present low standard of business integrity. The living for self and consequent gaining of wealth with all its comforts serves but to strengthen the individual in his own self-sufficiency, which is one of the strongest characteristics, not only of the New Englander to-day, but of the whole American nation.

But to what does self-sufficiency lead? It leads to downfall and to death. It leads to the forgetting of God our Father and to the forgetting of God's laws. To reach the climax of human power, recognizing no higher, has been throughout all history the beginning of national decline—the beginning of the end. Nations in the past, which have forgotten God have been cut off. We are a nation which is fast forgetting God. How earnestly, then, must we seek to retrace our steps and avert our doom. New England must begin again where we used to retrace to the teaching of Christ in its original purity—a revival of our first simple faith—a revival which will strike right through this country, calling men to repentance. But not only must we repent, we must live for Christ, taking God into our hearts, having faith that He will deliver and keep us.

A Christian Church, controlled by the ungodly social conditions, must awaken to its duty. The clergy, controlled by a few men, whose accretion of wealth, by ill-gotten gains, dominates the Church must shake off this tyranny and come out boldly and in very truth live for Christ.

It is this coming back to God, obeying His laws, looking to Him first depending upon Him and not on self, that alone can save this country this nation to-day. Obedience to God's laws will bring justice with man's right to the use of the earth, more just laws of taxation, with all the blessings which follow therefrom, as out-

lined by eminent sociologists. Obedience to God's laws will bring strong men and women, such as the physical culturists dream of. This same obedience will destroy all the accreted medicines and mechanical contrivances, the invention of which, with the manufacture and sale broadcast throughout the country, means the destruction of the nation. Obedience to God's laws will develop the strong, healthy woman, who will not fear maternity, which under stress of the present unnatural demands of our social conditions is to-day the grievously dreary burden of womanhood.

Then, when society shall have been reconstructed, according to the dictates of justice; when our feet shall be set upon the solid rock, the sure foundation of righteousness; when education shall have realized its great ulterior purpose, by which the good in every child shall find full development in the man or woman fit for true citizenship; then our educators, those occupying high chairs of learning, our college presidents, shall be willing to sacrifice personal ambition and give to humanity the devotion and zeal which now they jealously reserve for exclusive fields; when every man shall have his right to the use of God's earth, then will it be time for the strenuous voice of our popular national hero and the cultured voice of our great educational leader, to unite in advocacy of the large family to impress upon men their solemn duty to multiply and replenish the earth. Until then let us consider it a wise provision of nature and be devoutly thankful that the superior graduate has not been able to reproduce himself as rapidly as some might wish.

And now, in conclusion, wherein lies New England's salvation? Let us not rest upon that forlorn hope that the good old soil must be replenished by the child of the foreigner. Let us a thousand times rather return to the faith of our fathers. There is enough of the grand old Puritan stock left yet to perpetuate itself for ages and, indeed, forever. Let us return, then, to the God of our fathers, believing that obedience to His laws alone will save us.
