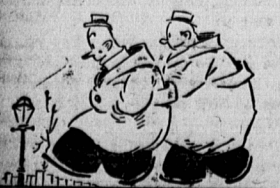

145 People Died In Bombay Riots

BOMBAY, India, Feb. 28—Recent disturbances in Bombay which involved rioting between Hindus and Pathans were discussed in the legislature of Bombay yesterday, after attention had been called to the matter the House voted to adjourn by 80 to 31.

The Home Secretary, J. Montehat, in replying to questions said 145 persons had been killed and 743 injured, including among the killed 89 Hindus, 25 Pathans, 29 other Mohammedans, one European and one Parsee.

The police, he said, had fired 53 rounds of ammunition and the military 115.

Seven Mohammedans and four Hindus had been killed by this fire.

So heavy were rains in the Dominican Republic recently that the Santiago-Puerto Plata highway, which is only six months old, was badly damaged.

Sydney Hotel Is Burned to Ground

NORTH SYDNEY, N. S., Feb. 28—The Belmont Hotel here was burned to the ground early yesterday morning, resulting in a loss of \$38,000. The cause of the fire was unknown. A blaze broke out in the kitchen at midnight and firemen left later believing it had been extinguished. Ten guests removed to other accommodations, the hotel staff returning to bed, about two a. m. the building was again discovered to be on fire. This time it could not be extinguished. The maids escaped with their clothing but Manager Fred Cleary was forced to the street in pajamas and an overcoat.

The total loss: Building \$25,000; equipment \$10,000, and adjoining property \$3,000.

MINER TELLS HOW HE ENJOYED HIS VISIT HERE

Describes Prince Edward Island as Most Beautiful Piece of Country He Ever Beheld.

From his home at Kingsville, Ontario, Jack Miner writes, in the "Renfrew Mercury," on his recent visit to the Maritime Provinces. He Says:

"For the last ten years I have been getting invitations to go to our Maritime Provinces on a lecture tour, and these invitations kept on multiplying until the pigeon-hole was about filled. Finally I decided to go, and am a better Canadian today through the fact that I did go, for no person can be greeted and treated twenty days in succession as these big-hearted real Canadian Maritimers treated me without becoming a bigger and better man."

"Yes, I had heard these old stories how they still used oxen on the farms down there and how there were aged people on Prince Edward Island that had never been off the Island, and so forth. I found these stories were true, and to me they were beautifully true."

After describing his arrival at St. Andrew's, N. B. and his enjoyable tour through various parts of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, Mr. Miner comes to the best part of the trip.

"My last two or three days were spent on Prince Edward Island, and oh, how agreeably surprised I was. Why, bless your life, it is not a farming country at all. It is a garden containing twenty-one hundred and fifty square miles. Really, without any exception, it is the most beautifully rolling and finely cultivated country I ever beheld and when I go here again I want to see those aged people that they will tell me have never been off the Island. Yes, I want to grip their hands and congratulate them. Well, my first stop was Charlottetown, where I was privileged to visit the ancient Parliament buildings and invited to sit down in the room where I understood our great and advantageous Federation was born. The next day we motored to Summerside, but at this stage I am simply done out or killed with kindness, and I ask permission to go to bed for two or three hours. After the lecture that night I was given a sort of 'farewell party,' and the next morning I steamed for home."

Stormy Weather Hard On Baby

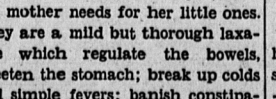
