FRANCE WILL PAY HER DEBT

Reparations Question Does not Concern United States at all, Declares Foreign Minister Briand, Decrying Any Attempt to Involve That Country in the Franco-German Negotiations.

(Special to the Guardian) GENEVA, Sept. 20.—"France is paying her debts to the U. S. and will continue paying them independent and regardless of the solutions reached in the future over reparations between Germany and the allies."

Govt. Railways Will Be Sold

(Canadian Press) EDMONTON, Alta., Sept. 20.—The government announced today the completion of negotiations by which subject to confirmation and ratification by the Dominion and Provincial legislatures, and the shareholders of the Canadian Pacific Railway the Provincial Government Railways will be sold to the C. P. R. with the express condition that the C. N. R. participate in half the obligation and half the benefits. The total purchase price is in the neighborhood of \$28,000,000.

Captain Dies on Ship's Bridge

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—Capt. Kurt Orahn of the Stuttgart, senior captain of the North German Lloyd Line, dropped dead of heart trouble on the liner's bridge today as the ship was backing out of Hoboken pier bound for Southampton, Boulogne and Bremen. News of his death was received at the line office in a radiogram from J. Clark, first officer, who assumed command upon Capt. Orahn's death and kept the vessel on her course.

SIR LOMER GOVIN DECLINES POST

OTTAWA, Sept. 20.—It is understood in the capital today that Sir Lomer Govin has decided to decline the Lieutenant-Governorship of Quebec. Sir Lomer, who was Minister of Justice in the first Mackenzie King cabinet, heretofore generally understood to have decided to accept. It is said, but without confirmation, that Sir Lomer may re-enter public life. Were he to take the Lieutenant-Governorship he would be out of public life for five years. He is, however, interested in the St. Lawrence waterways and other important matters. It is reported here Sir Lomer may accept a nomination in the next Dominion election.

WARNS U.S. "GUN-TOTERS"

Warning to Gunmen From American Cities Emphasized by Attorney General Price, Who Says They Will Find Canadian Justice "Pretty Swift"

TORONTO, Sept. 20.—"American gunmen must stay in their own backyard. Ontario doesn't want them, and will resist, with every power at her command, any possible invasion of the province, by such individuals." Attorney-General Price warned yesterday following a conference between officers of his department and Provincial Inspector Moss, of Windsor, Ont. The conference considered the situation created by the recent kidnapping of Samuel Low, sales manager for the Carling Brewery, by gangmen supposed to have come from Detroit.

THE GLOBE RAPS EULER

Failure of Government to Check Rum Running Into U. S. Scathingly Denounced by Chief Liberal Organ.

The Toronto Globe, chief Liberal newspaper in Canada, thus comments editorially in its issue of Sept. 18th on the excuse given by Hon. W. D. Euler, Minister of Customs, with reference to the export of Canadian liquor into United States. Mr. Euler's statement appeared in yesterday's Guardian:

"The Hon. W. D. Euler has just been to Windsor to look over the rum-running situation. While there he has attempted to condone his Revenue Department's present attitude toward the whole liquor export situation. 'I have no authority to stop this business, as suggested by The Toronto Globe and other critics,' the Minister said. 'I am not a policeman. I am in charge of the collection of national revenue. How is it possible for my Department, as the law now stands, to make any distinction between liquor and any other free commodity of international trade? All this liquor is duty-paid.'"

Excuse Lame and Halting

"Mr. Euler continues in the same tone. His utterance will be disappointing to those who had hoped that he would courageously tackle the greatest of tasks confronting his Department with which he has energy and ability with which he completed the lesser reforms within a sadly demoralized organization. The Minister is usually frank and outspoken. By contrast his Windsor utterance is the more lame and halting. He excuses his Department's partnership in a gigantic criminal operation by blaming the present law; but he cannot be too emphatic in this direction, as he and all other well-informed observers are aware that Mr. Euler himself is a member of the Government primarily responsible for that law.
