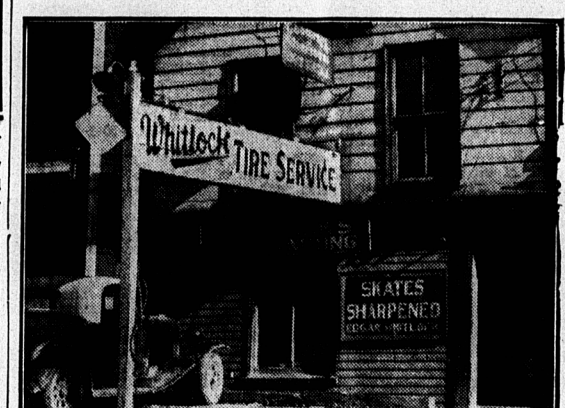

**Woman Official Says Relief Is Federal Problem**

EDMONTON, Sept. 30—(CP) — Relief in Canada must be divorced entirely from "party political influence" and administered nationally as a federal problem, according to Miss Margaret A. Carson, Western Canada's only woman civic relief superintendent. Neither provinces nor municipalities should be held responsible for unemployment and its attendant miseries, it was asserted in an interview by Miss Carson, chief relief officer for the last 19 years at Medicine Hat. The native of Orangeville, Ont., said she believed "party political problems," which she thinks would vanish under a national scheme of relief administration, constantly harass and distract relief officers, diverting their energies from fundamental issues. "Relief is a problem so vast and so complex that its handling is fast becoming the major business of governments. That handling will grow increasingly more difficult, the problem itself increasingly distressing unless the Dominion takes over the whole burden on a nationwide scale. "Relief should be administered according to uniformly laid-down policies by a non-political federal commission having sub-agencies throughout the Dominion." Miss Carson, a sister of Dr. T. A. Carson, medical superintendent of Christie Street hospital in Toronto, was in Edmonton to attend a conference between civil and provincial relief officials in Alberta. She worked as a packer and stenographer in a Calgary biscuit factory going to Medicine Hat district 28 years ago.

appear in thirty-seven slim folio volumes designed by Bruce Rogers and illustrated by some of the foremost artists in the world. In selecting these artists, George Macy, director of the Limited Editions Club considered not only their skill as artists but also their ability to understand and appreciate the bookmaker's art. To each of the artists he sent a request to name five plays which he would like to illustrate. Fortunately, it proved possible to assign to each of the artists one of the plays he had chosen.

Molnar, a Hungarian, has illustrated "Coriolanus" with gouache paintings; Gill, English, has illustrated "Henry the Eighth" with wood-engravings; Lapshin, the Russian has illustrated "Titus Andronicus" with water colours in the modern manner; Legrand, the Frenchman has used lithographs in illustrating "Hamlet"; Carnevali, Italian, has made crayon drawings in the Renaissance style for "Twelfth Night"; Gordon Craig has used crayon drawings for "Macbeth"; Boardman Robinson has illustrated "King Lear" with drawings in line and wash and Arthur Rackham has done "A Midsummer Night's Dream" in water-colour.

Publication of this edition will extend over a period of a year. Surely one of the most unusual and appealing of modern dramatic productions must take place at Emery's Bridge in Maine where Gladys Hasty Carroll's dramatization of her own novel, "As the Earth Turns," is annually staged against the very setting of her book.

The Shaw farm itself is the setting, the people about whom Miss Carroll wrote, in her novel, take their character parts and the audience sits in the open before the Shaw cottage watching the drama unfold.

The Canadian Concert Association under the direction of George K. Milford has been making remarkable progress in the smaller cities in Canada during the past two seasons. Mr. Milford first commenced operations in the newer communities of Northern Ontario where he found the people hungry for good music, and under the plan of the Association appearances of very distinguished artists become available to these smaller centres on the most economical basis possible, without imposing financial responsibility on local individuals. Already the services of over thirty Canadian vocalists, pianists and violinists of high standing have been utilized.

This year the Association is organized in Peterborough, Kingston, North Bay, Kirkland Lake, Sudbury, Timmins, Sault Ste Marie, Fort Arthur, Port William, Brandon, Regina, Moose Jaw, Medicine Hat and Calgary, and the artists appearing include Marjorie Lawrence, Gladys Swarthout, Melchior Zimbalist, Poldi Mildner, Albert Hirsh and the Trudl Schoop Ballet.

Another interesting item is the Association's arrangement that whenever train schedules and other considerations allow, afternoon recitals are given to College students without cost as a contribution to their musical education. Over ten thousand students have already been so favoured and the number is expected to be increased this year.

The Hart House String Quartet—James Levey, Adolphe Koldofsky, Milton Blackstone and Boris Hambourg—are leaving Canada early in January for another European tour. They are booked to appear in Norway, Sweden, Denmark, France, Belgium, Finland, Poland and Great Britain, with two recitals in London.

Before their departure they will make many appearances in the United States and Canada including a series of three concerts in Hart House, Toronto. Their last year's tour was such a decided success that their popularity has become widespread. They have been named Canada's indefatigable ambassadors of goodwill in the musical world.
