FORGOTTEN PEOPLE

An aftermath of war of which all too little is known, and of which very little is said, is the replacement of peoples who have been moved around like cattle because of an adjustment in European national boundaries. Men and women and little children whose only crime was that of having been born in a certain place and of certain parents have suffered and are today suffering untold agony. Thousands upon thousands of people of differing racial stock have been forcibly torn away from the homes in which they were born. They have not been consulted in the matter.

W. C. T. U. PROTESTS OPENING OF BARS WITHOUT VOTE

Protesting the denial to "five large cities of educated and intelligent people the privilege of expressing their opinion, by vote, on the question of cocktail bars," the Toronto District W. C. T. U. at their annual meeting went on record as declaring the action "dictatorial for a democratic and Christian country."

The same meeting criticized the government for not putting into effect recommendations by a Royal Commission in respect to penal reform, and decided to forward the idea by enlarging its own citizenship department to include "penal reform."

Disapproval of "the present trend in current literature and magazines towards immorality and the use of liquor as a social asset," was voiced, also the tendency towards the violation of the Sabbath laws in the buying of ice-cream, cigars and other commodities on Sunday. Games practice for public sports also came in for some adverse criticism.

Commendation was given the Board of Education and Home and School Council for instruction of pre-marital and parent education; to the 48 young people who won awards on temperance examinations; to Alcoholics Anonymous, the Youth for Christ movement, Boys' Parliament, Youth's Peace, and all other organizations for the religious and temperance training of young people.

The Toronto district contributed \$1,000 in memory of Mrs. P. J. Wain to Mrs. J. H. Wickson, Dominion president, thereby completing paying for the Dominion headquarters in this city. Mrs. J. H. Grant, Mrs. M. Squire and Miss J. Shaver were made world life members of the Union by the district.

A BAN ON THE TREATING CUSTOM IN SOUTH AFRICA

A "no treating" ban came into force early in December. The standing of drinks to males in bars, hotels, clubs and all other licensed premises is now illegal in the Union and South-West Africa. Among other things, it is illegal to give or lend money to anybody for the purpose of enabling him to pay for liquor. The results of a previous "no treating" ban in England astounded many. There was a decrease in drunkenness, mortality and crime.
