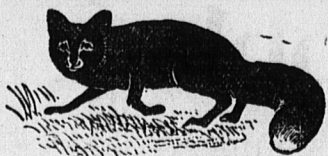

### MONTREAL JUDGE, IN TEARS, SENTENCES MAN TO DEATH.

MONTREAL, June 9.—With Mr. Justice Pelletier in tears and pronouncing the sentence of death for murder in a choking voice, Luigi Romano stood calmly in the prisoner's dock in the court of King's bench this afternoon and heard his doom, while at the same time his wife was carried from the court house screaming hysterically.

Ramano was sentenced to be hanged on Friday, Oct. 15, for the murder of Umberto Califormo. It was his second trial and conviction, and the judge fixed the date of execution late enough to enable the prisoner's counsel to make another appeal to the court of appeal, which will be in September term. The second trial was granted because of a comment to the jury by Mr. Justice Laverne, at the first trial, on the prisoner not having testified on his own behalf. His counsel now claims that there has not been positive proof that the murdered man was Umberto Califormo.

### WERNER HORN IN COURT AGAIN

ST. JOHN, June 9.—At Boston, on Monday, Werner Horn, the German army officer, who was arrested in connection with the attempt to blow up the International Bridge between New Brunswick and Vancouver, B. C., on Feb. 2 last, presented a demurrer to the indictment charging him with carrying explosives from New York to Vancouver in violation of the Federal laws.

Horn attacked the indictment on technical grounds and filed a plea against the jurisdiction of the court. The plea is based on the contention that he committed an act of war, and consequently was beyond the jurisdiction of the United States Courts.
