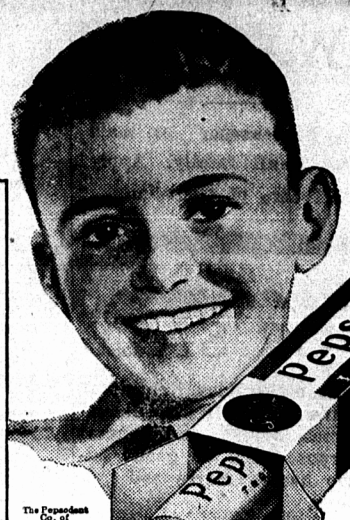

## Mrs. R. E. Sutherland Reviews Some Issues in Federal Contest

Following are excerpts from an address given last night by Mrs. R. E. Sutherland, president of the Women's Progressive Conservative Association, in the interests of the Progressive Conservative candidates in this Province.

Mr. Ralston, with the horrors of battle ringing in his ears, resigned from the King Government over the conscription issue. Following in his footsteps were the two other men, who helped build Canada's fighting forces—Hon. C. Power, Minister for Air, and Hon. Angus Macdonald, Minister for Naval Affairs. And so, when Mr. King goes before you, he goes not with the backing of experience which he told you in his talk on Wednesday night—twenty-six other members of the present Liberal Party will not seek re-election on that day. No doubt, they too may have demanded an answer to why the wishes of the plebeians of April 27, 1942 which cost this country over three million dollars, had not been carried out. That is the true record of the Liberal Government and their leader with regard to our boys who were willing to give, not just material things for our security, but life and limb itself.

Contrast with this the stand taken by the Progressive Conservative members in the House of Commons in their consistent demands for an all out war effort and their fight for re-inforcements for Canadians fighting overseas. From the very outbreak of war, their stand was a definite one. These members backed the policy of the Progressive Conservative leader, John Bracken—the policy which was backed and will continue to back, the men and women of our Armed Forces. By your backing of this policy, our veterans will be given a square deal. No veteran shall suffer loss because of his war services. Those who have suffered disabilities through their service in the Armed Forces, will be given every care and support which this country can give them. They will be regarded not as subjects of charity, but rather as recipients of Canada's gratitude, appreciation and good-will. Their dependents will be looked after and not made to suffer because a father, a brother, or a son gave his life or his health in the service of his country.

It is now almost impossible for a man or woman who has been discharged from the forces, to prove that his disability was deliberately connected with his period of service. That is the way our Pension Law has read in Canada—and as a proof of this, I now offer to you one case, the case of a young man in this very city of Charlottetown who in the year 1939, was admitted to the Army in category A1. After his period of training in Canada, he proceeded overseas, and on the battle fields of Italy he received a wound which kept him in the hospital for three months. Through sheer lack of re-inforcements, he was again returned to the front lines and again he was forced out of combat—this time suffering from shell blast. After his second sojourn in the hospital he was sent back to England and finally to Canada to be retrained. He is in the Army in lower category with an honourable discharge. Upon applying for the pension which he so rightly deserves, he is told that his present condition is due to pre-war activities. This is the case of a man who serves no pension. Is he the beginning of an Army of forgotten men?

Fully recognizing our country's great debt to the men and women in the services, the Progressive Conservative Party backs itself to the policy of its leader, John Bracken, that no man should be back as a veteran from active service has to prove that his disability was due to his period of service. Instead, the burden of proof must be on the government rather than on the man himself. Let his medical record speak for itself. Have you ever asked yourself what has happened to our Fox Industry—the industry which put Prince Edward Island on the map? The policy of the present Liberal Government is gradually destroying the fur ranching industry, and it is responsible for its rapid approach to extinction. During 1944, over 9 million dollars worth of raw furs were brought into this country. In January of this year alone, over one and a half million dollars worth of raw furs were brought in duty free. Is there any definite reason why these furs should be allowed to enter into this country duty free, while the fur ranchers of Prince Edward Island are required to pay a tax of 35 per cent. on all furs entering the United States, and in Canada a processing tax of 10 per cent is imposed on all furs? The Progressive Conservative Party when elected to power will lift this tax, and once again the little Island of our will be back on the map.

To the Sisters of Service \$50.00, Sisters of Precious Blood \$5.00, Sisters of Martha \$5.00. Budget \$250.00. Scholarship \$25.00. Miriam Club \$5.00, Red Cross \$5.00, T. B. League \$5.00. Lottery in connection with bazaar \$5.00, Girl Guides \$5.00. We also contributed \$30.00 towards delegate sent to Montreal and \$20.00 towards C.W.L. Silver Jubilee which is to be celebrated this year. War Services: There were four masses offered for our boys and

ten lots of cigarettes sent overseas also seven ditty bags filled and sent to the Sailors Club, a Christmas box sent to a chaplain overseas and five dollars given to Red Cross. The total amount of money spent was \$377.24. Following is a list of articles made for the Red Cross. Eight men's large sweaters, six pair army socks, 5 pair men's gloves, 1 large helmet, 2 pairs boys stockings, 1 boys suit, 2 boys pull-overs, 4 child's shorts. Last August the president and four members of the C.W.L. attended the diocesan convention. Ten dollars was placed at the disposal of those ladies. An insight into C.W.L. work was gained by those present. In conclusion we wish to thank the chaplain, Father Kiggins for his interest in league work, the officers and members and all who cooperated in helping out to make the year a success.
