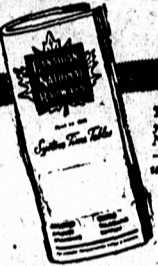

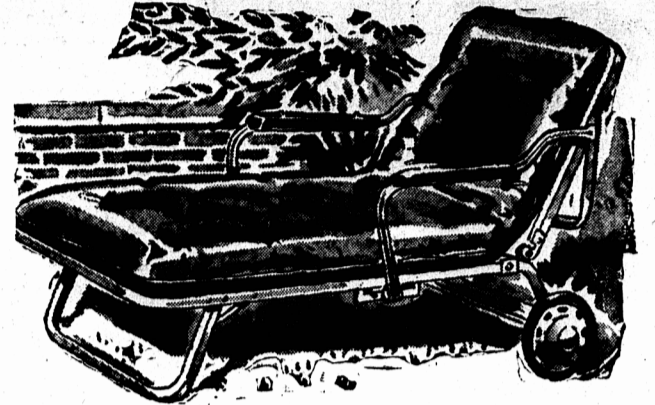

—O'LEARY PASTORAL CHANGE The United Church of Canada, Rev. W. G. Dickson, B. A. 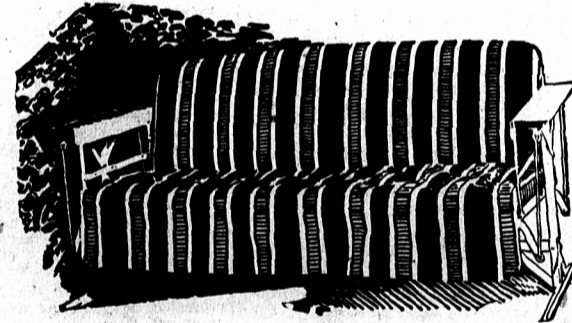


RECLINER AND LAWN CHAIRS—covered with plain colored duck or striped awning cloth, these are in natural finish and a white enamelled finish.

FOLDING CORVETTE CHAIRS —perfect for lawn, porch or garden. Made of strong hardwood either enamelled or in natural finish.

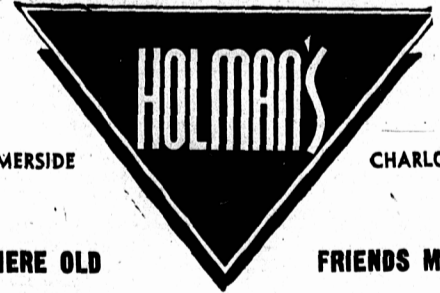
