Visitation Of Grand Master At Wildey Lodge

This evening at Odd Fellows Hall at 8:00 p.m., Wildey Lodge No. 27 I. O. O. F. will entertain the Grand Master by a special service arranged for the occasion. An invitation has been extended to all other lodges, both subordinate and Rebekah, to join in this welcoming service and a large attendance is expected. The Grand Master will be accompanied by a number of Past Grand Masters, Past Grand Patriarchs, and Past Presidents of the Rebekah Assembly together with his Deputy of the District which will add color to the service and importance to the meeting. The Grand Master this year is Brother H. N. Soley of Springhill, N.S., who is on a tour of official visitations. His first official visit to Charlottetown and consequently it is being looked upon with expectation and interest. Elected at last session of Grand Lodge held at Fredericton, N.B., on August 21st, 11th and 12th last, at which time plans were made to carry out the several projects chosen, he is expected to have important instructions to give and valuable advice to offer in the interest and for the advancement of the Order.

From the reports of the supreme body of the Order, the Sovereign Grand Lodge, which has recently completed its sessions, it is pleasing to note that much progress has been made during the past year, particularly gratifying is the fact that some of the quasi-jurisdictional bodies of Latin America and Europe have again come back to the fold. These jurisdictions have been able to re-establish the Order within their countries, with a resuscitation of some of the subordinate lodges, to the extent that their grand lodges have been brought back to active association also. In all cases reported, the membership has been substantial. A warm welcome to the Grand Master, on his visit to Charlottetown, is being extended, and I. O. O. F. assistance is being given for the re-establishment of the Order in bigger and better, on these distant shores.

Continuous Growth

On the American continent the reports indicate a continuation of the growth for so long considered phenomenal. Increased membership, renewed interest, improved financial conditions, progress with I. O. O. F. educational assistance for educational purposes, have all had prosperous boosts during the past year. The increase in membership in all branches has reached a new high at an annual standard, and the information is, that this is continuing. Thus the city lodges of Odd Fellows and Rebekahs, in welcoming and honoring their Grand Master can be proud of the Order of which he is the jurisdictional head; also that his visitation to Charlottetown finds this local center enjoying its full share of prosperity which characterizes the general average of prosperous centers.

Odd Fellowship was established in Charlottetown by the institution of St. Lawrence Lodge No. 8 in October 1869. None of the early members are alive today. In looking over the membership record, it is pleasing to find that some of the leading citizens were among its membership. Brother George M. Moore, of the firm of Moore and MacLeod, has been a continuous member for seventy years, one of the oldest Odd Fellows in Canada, and high on the membership record list in United States; he is still hale and hearty and occupies a warm place in the hearts of the members who are pleased to regard him as a grand and worthy brother.

There are many other members who hold veteran jewels for twenty-five or more years of continuous membership, of whom have been honored by being presented with the prescribed jewel.

As the members of the Order gather at their hall this evening, it is with the great satisfaction of knowing that their Order is doing a good work; that its usefulness and service is of great benefit to the widow, orphan, aged, indigent, homeless; and it is not a charitable organization but a fraternal one in the true sense of the word. With a spirit of thankfulness they will welcome their Grand Master, and will listen with interest to his message which will be one of good will to all.

MARITIME FERTILIZER COUNCIL TO RECOMMEND HIGHER FERTILIZER ANALYSES

At the annual meeting of the Maritime Fertilizer Council held in Halifax on August 19 and 20, it was decided to discontinue recommending the 2-12-6 and 4-8-10 brands of fertilizer and to replace them with the higher analysis brands 3-15-6 and 5-10-13. The object was to reduce or discontinue altogether the use of filler in these fertilizers. While the two brands 2-12-6 and 4-8-10 will not be recommended, their sale may continue until some of the companies who have already mixed some for next spring have sold their supply. (A Charlottetown fertilizer dealer said figures quoted in an article in the Guardian Thursday were inaccurate in places. The figures quoted here are now correct, he said.)

The Council decided to adopt the policy to recommend only those mixtures containing a maximum amount of plant food. These higher analysis brands may cost more per ton of fertilizer but the farmers should benefit in that the fertilizer should cost less per unit of plant food. Furthermore, the farmers of the Maritimes will likely save substantially as the freight costs on filler in the fertilizer will be reduced or eliminated.

The general trend in Canada is for higher analysis fertilizers. It



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
