BISHOP CARMICHAEL AND NEW THEOLOGY

His Lordship Discusses the New Interpretation of the Scriptures

New York, Feb. 18.—"No man having drunk old wine, straightaway dealer's new, for he saith the old is better."—St. Luke 5: 39.

On this text, Bishop Carmichael addressed a fair congregation at St. George's Sunday.

There was nothing so easy, he said as the making of a religion to meet the methods of our own living, there was nothing easier than to have a private, personal idea of what a Christian may be, a standard of Christian living and belief, generally a lower standard—and then to live up to that standard which we had raised ourselves. It required no cleverness, no marked ability to water down the word of God.

A new theology had arisen in England, but no man had the right, without having his authority certified by God, to uproot things as they were and as they had ever been. We did not want this new theology. The old was better.

The holy scriptures told of God's hatred of sin and yet of His love for the sinner. "I want you to recognize" went on the preacher "that these are vital truths revealed to us by God in the written word of God and taught by the Church of Christ from the earliest age to the present moment. There may be minor points on which Christians differ, but Christianity cannot exist where these great truths are watered down or pushed to one side to make way for a jargon of reconciling words meant to bring unconvertible things into use. Such words are words of abject surrender of things divine to purchase the applause of unbelievers."

The whole duty of Christians was to follow Christ as revealed in the Holy Scriptures, and to have nothing to do with anything that conscience showed to be a barrier between the believer and his God.

Rev. K. G. McPherson P.P. at St. Margaret's read the burial service. He leaves to mourn a sorrowing widow, one son Daniel at home and one brother Joseph, blacksmith at Monticello.—Com.

IMPROVEMENT FOR WATER FRONT New York, Feb. 16.—The board of estimate, at the meeting, formally approved of the Dock Commissioner Fensell's plan for the development of the South Brooklyn water front, and authorized by condemnation acquisition of its city blocks. Controller Metz called the attention of Mr. Benzel to the bill before the committee on rivers and harbors in the House of Representatives to dredge Buttermilk channel to a depth of 35 feet. The proposition was to dredge it 40 feet. Mr. Metz said that the change might seriously interfere with the proposed improvement.
