Fish will have to come down. "Take the situation today," he said, "there are 4,000,000 pounds of canned fish on the domestic market, that is to say on the shelves of retail stores and in the warehouses of wholesalers. That's too great a carry-over of the 1946 catch.

"Until very recently canned lobster was selling for \$1 per half-pound can. At that price you had something like a buyers' strike. The housewife knew lobster was a luxury product and she also felt lobster wasn't worth that much and refused to pay it.

"The result is that there's a considerable carry-over of 1946 lobster in the hands of dealers, and this surplus will force down the price of the 1947 pack. In fact the price of canned lobster has been dropping steadily."

The Mount Stewart Senator said the same situation prevailed in canned chicken, haddock, herring and canned fillets. Only minor quantities of these fish were canned before the war, and unless new markets were found, the industry would simply have to stop canning them. The suggestion had been made to the Government Senator McIntyre said, to extend credits to some of the needy nations which would permit them to buy canned and salt fish from the Maritimes in quantity.

BILL TO IMPLEMENT

tenant-Governor of Manitoba, and his distinguished wife who took keen interest in the affairs and beauties of our province.

6. The unusual number of Conventions at Charlottetown grows from year to year, making our capital city one of the most popular Convention cities of Canada.

7. The year 1947 is the centenary of the occupation of this Province Building. In the year 1847 Governor Huntley was succeeded by Governor Campbell, who died in 1850, and he was succeeded by Governor Bannerman, who immediately on arrival in 1851 called together the Legislature and granted Responsible Government, which had been so ably advocated by the Honourable George Coles, who then became leader.

8. During the past year My Government participated in a series of Dominion-Provincial Conferences on questions of finance, social security and public investments. In view of the termination of the wartime tax agreement and in order to avoid the consequent prospect of a return to the pre-war dual system of direct taxation, a Dominion-Provincial arrangement has been reached whereby certain provinces suspend the levying and collection of certain taxes for the next five years. In return for this concession, the Government of Canada is to make annually to the agreeing provinces certain agreed compensatory payments. You will be asked to consider a Bill intended to implement the provisions of such arrangement.

9. My Government intends to urge upon the Government of Canada the necessity of calling at the earliest possible date, a further conference on social security and public investment.

10. When Public Investment plans are concluded with the Government of Canada, it is hoped that assistance to provincial roads, buildings, agriculture, fisheries, and forestry, will be secured, and when the Health and Social Security plans are developed a large measure of reform and assistance will be provided as aid to the mentally ill, aid to hospitals, to sanatoria, and to preventable disease in general.

11. Due to an improved fiscal position it is planned to increase grants to hospitals, give more attention to winter roads, reduce taxes, and improve facilities in agriculture, as soon as suitable personnel is available. When public investment and public security measures are arranged with the Government of Canada, it is anticipated that improvements to roads, buildings, agriculture, vocational education, fisheries, health and social security, will expand considerably.

12. A Public Utilities Commission has been appointed and the same personnel consisting of the Motor Carrier Board, Legislation will be introduced to enlarge and strengthen its authority.

13. The demand for electric energy continues to increase with little relief in sight immediately. The installation of a new turbine at the Maritime Electric Company plant in the near future will help expand the section served by it. Immediately, when materials are available, steps will be taken to expand electric services to the limit of production of power. At the moment it is hoped that existing plants will increase their capacity to meet the demand.

14. A new department of government is contemplated to control many activities now being undertaken by other departments, or without a department. The Tourist Industry, Publicity, The Fishermen's Loan Board, The Fisheries, Reconstruction, Planning, Trade and Industry, may all come under the new department.

15. Tourists continue to come to Prince Edward Island in increasing numbers. The housing and catering accommodations are considered to be inadequate. A capital sum will be provided at a proper rate of interest for loans to improve housing, catering, and general hotel accommodations. Legislation to control hotels and tourist accommodations will be presented.

16. The new ice-breaker "Abegweit" will go into service early in 1947, replacing the "Charlottetown" which was lost at sea in 1941. The new ship is reputed to be the finest of her type yet built, and was built in Canada from Canadian materials. The docks are being improved. An enlarged new harbour is being built at Tormentine, with a new dock on an extension 800 feet outside the present dock at Tormentine. At Borden, a protective fin is being added and a new dock. Thus two docks on each side will provide a much needed improvement, and will facilitate the establishment of supplementary boats for motor car traffic when they are completed.

17. The overproduction of potatoes in 1946 in both Canada and the United States has created a difficult situation. My Government has cooperated with the Government of Canada in arranging a sale of all our exportable potatoes to Great Britain at a price of \$1.86 per 100 pounds at the ships' side. These shipments are already going forward through the port of Saint John, New Brunswick, and after April first will be loaded at the Prince Edward Island ports of Georgetown, Souris, Summerside, and Charlottetown. An Export Potato Board has been constituted under the Marketing Act of 1940 to manage the shipment.

18. My Government recognizes the great need of a national feed and live stock policy. To support the large number of live stock now existing in our province, the continuance of the freight assistance policy, or an alternative policy, which will bring western grain at fair prices, must be applied if farmers are to continue to produce live stock and their products in the present or larger volume.

19. My Government recognizes that our insular position has many advantages. Among the advantages are freedom from plant and animal diseases. A rare opportunity is afforded to control such diseases as Bacterial Ring Rot in potatoes, Tuberculosis and Bangs Disease in cattle, Cholera and Rhinitis in hogs, Pullorum disease in poultry, and thus make more profitable than elsewhere the maintenance of herds and crops in a healthy condition, which will create a demand for our healthy products abroad.

20. The scarcity of qualified school teachers continues. Due to this, and because of the small numbers entering Prince of Wales of College for training, my Government will make provision for increased salaries for teachers, will furnish assistance to teachers-in-training, will help rural schools to improve property and equipment, will continue to provide correspondence instruction, and will seek to effect amalgamation of small districts. It is also proposed to expand the Supervisory Service with a view to providing more training for teachers in service.

21. The establishment of rural High Schools will be begun, and the necessary preliminary step of uniform valuation and assessment will be undertaken as provided in the Assessment Act of 1946.

22. The programme of Physical Fitness will be extended and Vocational Training for veterans draws to a close, plans will be made for integrating this work with the general programme of education.

23. The Department of Reconstruction has taken an active part in the disposal of War Assets. The priority of my province was invoked and purchases made for public use, or distributed to public institutions, or to veterans and farm-ers, when they required them, at cost.

24. The Housing Project at Maple Hills which was abandoned on May 31, 1946, by the City of Charlottetown, was taken over in the emergency. It is not proposed to continue to manage it after September, 1947, on account of the condition of the buildings, central heating equipment, and power lines.

25. The Provincial Planning Board of my Government has begun a ground level, economic and sanitary survey of the thickly settled areas contiguous to Charlottetown. If this survey proves acceptable it may be extended to other areas.

26. The Farm Beautification Program's popularity will insure its continuance. Presently the Cotton Trust Beautification plans will supplement the program, and a Forestry station will also assist. More beautiful holdings can be achieved by tree, shrub, and flower planting, as well as by better architecture, layout, fences, and general neatness.

27. An epidemic of poliomyelitis (infantile paralysis) occurred in the past year, and was particularly located in King's County. A clinic was established at the sanatorium to assist in curing the paralyzed. A health survey by the Department of Public Health and Welfare, Ottawa, was conducted in co-operation with our Health Department in 1946. The report has not yet reached us, but it is anticipated that many valuable facts bearing on health problems in relation to the milk supply on Prince Edward Island will be presented. Comcedental, with the same staff, the Department of Fisheries, Ottawa, investigated shell fish from the standpoint of health. Cancer diagnosis has been proceeding for some months anticipating the establishment of a Cancer Diagnostic Clinic. Property has been purchased with the anticipation of great development in the near future when joint plans with the Government of Canada are concluded.

28. We welcome evidence of the development of industry. The establishment of canning plants has been a feature of expansion in this direction. A newer effort is the location of a business at Charlottetown which can do much to develop the production of pecking vegetables, and small fruits, for which this province has always been admirably adapted, but has been hampered by inadequate markets. It is hoped that the establishment in Prince Edward Island of the largest concern in Canada will insure markets for our farmers at prices equivalent to those obtained at other producing points in Canada. The development of this industry necessitates the establishment of more refrigeration space and quick freezing.

29. The accounts and reports of the various departments of government will be presented, as well as interim reports for the current fiscal year. The Estimates for the next fiscal year will be presented. I trust your deliberations will reflect and guide the popular view. May Divine Providence watch over you in your deliberations.

NOTICE

HIGHWAYS CLOSED TO MOTOR VEHICLES

COMMENCING Monday, March 17, 1947, and until further notice, all highways in this Province are closed for Motor Vehicle traffic, (including tractors and trailers), except in such cases where the total weight of vehicle and load does not exceed 5,000 lbs.

Trucks hauling potatoes will be permitted a total weight of vehicle and load not exceeding 11,000 pounds, provided the hauling is done in the morning before 12 o'clock noon, between storage space and the nearest Railway siding.

Anyone driving on Provincial highways contrary to this order shall be duly prosecuted.
