

Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY even numbered section of lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 24, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entries must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father for mother, if the father is deceased, of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the homestead, a residence may be satisfied by one person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands a copy of intention to apply for patent.

Board of Health is a power in securing information as to consumptive cases, and this is one of the means by which the spread of the disease may be prevented. A discussion was participated in by Rev. Mr. Gillis, John Anderson and others, and a vote of thanks was tendered Dr. McLellan and Mr. Wyatt, for their interest in the convention, and for the valuable information received.

The next number on the program was an excellent paper on Physiology and Hygiene in relation to the School, by Miss Ethel A. Tanton. She stated that correct reading on a physiological basis was essential for school pupils; that proper ventilation should be secured and a proper space should be given each pupil. She made reference to systems in vogue in Germany, and pointed out the benefits of having a Medicinal Inspector. This paper was discussed by Pres. Bennett, Dr. McLellan, Inspector Matthews and J. E. Wyatt. A vote of thanks was tendered Miss Tanton, who made a suitable reply. The meeting adjourned.

(4) Resolved that this Association urge upon the Board of Education to introduce Kindergarten work more generally in our schools.

(5) Resolved that in the opinion of this convention it is desirable that stricter attention be paid to physical culture and hygiene in the public schools, and the proper regulations be made with a view to the inspection and preservation of the health of the children, and further resolved that instruction as to the causes, prevention and cure of Tuberculosis should form a part of Public School Curriculum, and further resolved that our School Inspector be requested to report at the next meeting of this Convention, such schools where conditions exist as are detrimental to the progress and health of the children.
