TORONTO GLOBE AND THE WAR.

even if they are sometimes wrong, that to be always in doubt. The Toronto Globe among Canadian newspapers affords a conspicuous instance of positive views in regard to the war in the East. The Globe has published excellent war despatches, with well considered comments thereon daily, and is more than confident of Japanese success in the near future and in the ultimate issue of the war. "Russia will be driven out of China, in which she cannot recover any footing for years to come, if ever," says The Globe. "Japan will be in a position to dictate terms of peace to Russia, and will probably be able to make them severe. It is not likely that she will stop in her course of victory until she is able to clear China of the Russian forces and stipulate that the integrity of Chinese territory must hereafter be respected."

On to Harbin and perhaps further the victorious Japanese forces will go. "Vladivostok must be captured, if the war lasts long enough, and how long it will last depends on the Japanese rather than on the Russians." This point is further argued in the article before us till the conclusion is again reached that "it is probable, if not certain that the war will not end till Vladivostok is taken." The Japanese Government has declared its purpose to allow Korea her independence but the Japs will soon overrun both Korea and eastern Manchuria adjacent to it. Then will follow peaceful absorption and further expansion. These are the bold predictions of the Globe. We must admit that a fulfillment is quite possible, and while we are by no means sanguine of the rapid, continued and final success of the Japanese in the present struggle as The Globe is, we confess to a liking for clear cut, positive opinions and forecasts which in this case we would gladly see fulfilled to the letter.

PARLIAMENT PROROGUED.

Early in March last, the Canadian Parliament assembled and Sir Wilfrid Laurier expressed the hope that proration would take place in the leafy month of June. But the end only came yesterday, after a five months sitting instead of one of three months, as Sir Wilfrid fondly hoped. He has expressed his intention to hereafter call Parliament together in January, if practicable.

The session just closed will long be memorable for the final ratification of the agreement for the construction of the National Transcontinental Railway, commonly called the "Grand Trunk" Pacific, and for the extremely large amount of money voted for public services—some eighty one millions of dollars. It seems probable that the session just closed is the last of the present Parliament, and that a general election will take place before or early in the new year.

The new Admiralty shipbuilding programme includes two mammoth battleships and four 23 knot armoured cruisers. These six ships will cost \$40,000,000.

A report has been cabled from London that two Russian cruisers have left the Baltic and are chasing a steamer, which left England July 30th for Canada. This brings the war a little closer home to us.

The death is announced of Lady Tweedmouth, wife of Lord Tweedmouth, step mother of Lady Aberdeen, and sister of the late Lord Randolph Churchill. Lady Tweedmouth was one of the six daughters of the seventh Duke of Marlborough, all of whom became leaders of English society. One of her sisters, Countess Howe, is now critically ill with paralysis. Another sister is Lady Sarah Wilson, who was captured by the Boers outside Mafeking. Lady Fanny Octavia Louisa Spencer Churchill was born in 1838, and married Lord Tweedmouth in 1873.

CH'TOWN FARMERS' MARKET.

The market Tuesday was almost a woman's market. Blueberries were in full supply and sold from 5 to 75c per qt. Other small fruits were in good supply at the following prices: raspberries 8 to 10c, gooseberries 6 to 7c, currants 8 to 9c. Butter (prints) is a little higher at 22c per lb for choice. Eggs sold at 15c per doz. A considerable number loads of new hay were bought for 45 to 55c per 100 lbs. Old potatoes sold at 25 to 30c per bus, new potatoes 20c per peck. The market was meagerly supplied with oat, white, for home consumption bringing 40c's per bus and black from 2 to 4 cts higher. Eggs for export are steady at 14 cts per doz and the supply decreasing. Live hogs best lots sell at 54c's per lb.
