Dixie Walker Retains Batting Spot in Nat.

NEW YORK, June 17 (AP)—Fred (Dixie) Walker, who smacks southpaw hitting just as hard as he bats right-hand, is continuing to give opposition moundmen a tough time.

The popular 35-year-old left-handed swinging outfielder of Brooklyn Dodgers tacked four points to his average during the last week including games at Philadelphia by one run.

Four times in the last week he has increased his mark to .370 and retain the lead in the National League's individual batting tournament for the third consecutive week.

Johnny Hopp of Boston was runner-up to Walker with .369 and Stan Musial of St. Louis was third with .340. Johnny Mize of Philadelphia is one point for the fourth run with .337.

Pistol Pete Reiser of Brooklyn has stolen 12 bases, including five in that division.

Freddie Kirby Hight of Brooklyn tops the hurlers with two wins and one loss record. Emil Kuntz specialist of Chicago, is second to him with one win and one loss without suffering a setback.

Mickey Vernon Has Threat To Batting Lead

CHICAGO, June 17 (AP)—First baseman Mickey Vernon, who has a batting average of .372 in the last week, is threatening to take the lead in the National League batting tournament from Ted Williams of Boston.

Despite his first setback of the season by Chicago White Sox last Saturday, Boston's Dave Perriss maintained top place in the pitching department with a 10-2 record. Bobby Feller of Cleveland raised his strikeout total to 145.

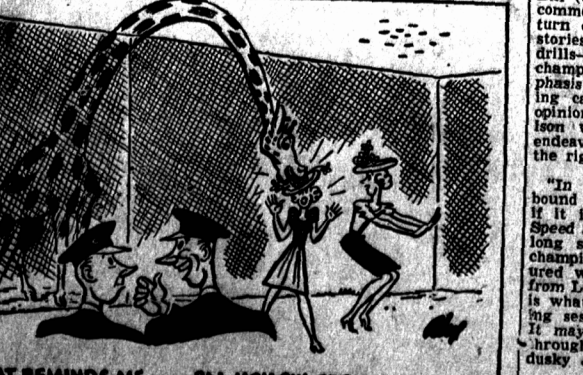

HEALTH LEAGUE OF CANADA

Meals should not be looked upon merely as time spent in eating. In quantity sufficient to satisfy hunger, say nutrition experts. From Ottawa, Nutrition Division of the Department of National Health and Welfare, Ottawa, has issued a reminder that it is food quality more than quantity, which counts in maintaining health. They advise people dining in restaurants as well as those eating at home, to study food intake, to ensure health.

DIET RULES

Home-makers, and particularly those responsible for preparation of family menus, are reminded by the Ottawa, Ontario, Health and Welfare, Ottawa, of importance of carefully-selected foods in ensuring health, both in the home and in the restaurant.

FLY MENACE

Reminding Canadians that flies are still a menace, the Department of National Health and Welfare, Ottawa, has issued a seasonal warning in the war against these pests. It is advised that special care be taken this summer to check screens to keep flies out of buildings, particularly where there are young children. It is suggested that parents use means of their family allowance money to provide adequate screens and mosquito netting.

ASPARAGUS

Asparagus shoots are now appearing in the garden plot and are a pleasant reminder that other fresh vegetables will soon be ready. Asparagus should be cut below the bed. When cut stalks are served, it looks best for the asparagus to be served in a small amount of boiling salted water. St. Louis Cards Win Twin Bill At Boston

While Brooklyn Dodgers were idle yesterday, St. Louis Cardinals clipped a full game off their National League lead by downing Boston Braves twice in a twin bill at Boston. The Cards started with a five-run first-inning bang by the catcher and coasted to a 9-6 win, but had all they could do to scratch out a 1-0 margin in the twilight nightcap.

Howie Pollet gave the Braves only six hits in the afternoon, while his mates could get only one more off big Bill Lee. The only run was scored after an error on a potential double play.

Pollet struck after one was out in the sixth. Jeff Cross banged the ball down the third base line and Billy Herman grabbed it. He threw to Conde Ryan to erase Pollet but Ryan's peg to first called by Johnny Hopp into the Cards' dugout, allowing Cross to take second. Ernie Duesak promptly belted a liner to centre which bounced off the back of the plate for a double scoring Cross.

In the first game, Ernie White made his first start since 1942, when he then played with the Cardinals. He lasted long enough to pitch to four batters, walking the first two and watching two doubles bounce off the bats of the next two Red Birds for three runs.

Steve Rorer replaced White and two more singles and a fielder's choice gave Cards their five runs.
