Murphy's Single Is Winning Blow

Jack Murphy, on the mound for the R.C.A.F. Blue Sox, won his own ball game in the fifth inning at the Summerside High School diamond last evening, driving a scorching grounder through McCulloch at third base to score O'Neill who had walked and advanced to second on a wild pitch. It was the only run of the game and the 1 to 0 victory gave the Blue Sox a 1 to 0 edge in games in their best-of-five final series with the R.C.A.F. Red Sox for the championship of the Summerside Town League.

MONTREAL, Aug. 29—(CP)—Ray (Sugar) Robinson, world welterweight champion, will seek to win the middleweight title but will retire in December, 1950, whether he's still champion or not, his manager said today.

"Win or not, Ray quits in December, 1950," said George Gainford, manager of the New York Negro, Negro featherweight, Ray Edwards, who fights Marcel Lachapelle here tomorrow night.

"Robinson will seek to meet the champion of the Lamotta-Cerdan fight, probably Lamotta," said Gainford.

Adams Winner Of Golf Club Title

CHICAGO, Aug. 29—(AP)—Trumpet Williams of Boston appears a sure favorite to take the 1949 American League batting title.

If Williams continues his pacesetting form, it will be the third straight time he will have won the batting championship, and his fifth since 1941.

The Red Sox slugger now in front for four weeks in a row, had a sizzling .339 average according to official figures computed through last Sunday's games. That was 20 points ahead of runner-up George Kell of Detroit who had .319.

Williams had a comfortable 11-point advantage the previous week, but last week he climbed three points while Kell dropped six.

Boston's Dom DiMaggio jumped into a third-place tie with Bob Dillinger of St. Louis after a seven-point rise to .328.

In the spectacular departments, Williams was a double leader, in runs with 127 and in hits with 165.

Vern Stephens of Boston and Williams share home-run honors with 34, and Stephens led in runs batted in with 139.

Kell and Williams had the most two-baggers, 35, while Mitchell led in triples with 19. Dillinger continued the top base-stealer with 14.

Best pitcher in every way was Mel Parnell of Boston. He headed the field on a percentage basis with 20-6 for .769, pitched the most complete games, 22, and racked up the most victories, 20.

Williams' batting average is .339, which is a record for a player in the American League since 1900. He has 165 hits in 487 at-bats, a .339 average.

Carelessness Robs Athletes Of Records

MONTREAL, Aug. 29—(CP)—More than a score of Canadian athletes have set records in track and field competition but have been robbed of official recognition because of careless local officials. This situation became known today with an appeal by Jack Davies, chairman of the records committee of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, to all local branches and officials to supply the necessary data.

Davies, whose 15-year service as chairman was interrupted by his war service, is again on the job and anxious to see that the record-makers get due recognition. "There are between 20 and 30 records—open, native and down to junior—that either have been ignored by local officials or improperly applied for," said Davies. "It is a regrettable situation. We want immediate action so the committee can deal with these records when the annual meeting of the A. A. U. of C. is held in Toronto later in November. All applications should be signed by the pertinent officials of the meet, such as judges, timekeepers, referee, clerk of course. There should also be newspaper clippings and the meet program so authenticity of the meet can be definitely established. It is also essential that applications in behalf of juniors be accompanied by affidavits as to age of the competitor. Davies, especially interested now in records since 1947, said he did not wish to single out any particular record or records still lacking because others might be ignored by officials asked to supply them—"We want all records."
