DR. ALLISON delivered a strong speech at the laying of the corner stone of the Baptist church in Middle Sackville, when he gave a brief history of the Baptist church in the Maritime Provinces. In 1761, six years after the expulsion of the Acadians from that land, a little schooner arrived at Woodpoint bringing to that country what proved to be the nucleus of the Baptist church. These people were from Rhode Island, and many persons now living in the Sackville parish are descendants of that handful of people who landed at Woodpoint. Strange to say these people were not Baptists but Congregationalists. Dr. Allison spoke of the advent of Nathan Mason and his followers, who came to Sackville a little later from Swansea. If the church as founded by Mr. Mason continued without a lapse from the day it was founded, the Sackville Baptist church is undoubtedly the oldest in Canada. There is some doubt about this, however, as Wolfville claims to have the oldest church, and he was inclined to believe that the Sackville church did not continue uninterrupted from the time of Mr. Mason. He referred to the struggles the church had to endure the rugged Christianity of its pioneers, and the power it had exercised for good throughout the length and breadth of the provinces.
