Just at the western extremity of Kent Street, where the lower promenade of the Park Roadway begins, there is a depression that should be filled up with a carload or two of clay. Eggs sold at eighteen cents a dozen and butter at eighteen to twenty cents a pound. The meat market was brisk, as was also the strawberry market, strawberries going at four boxes for twenty-five or eight to ten cents a ct.
