

# Shuffle Nets Irvin High-scoring Trio As Canadiens Go Through Fast Workout

ST. HYACINTHE, Que., Oct. 15 (CP)—Coach Dick Irvin of Montreal Canadiens today put one of his outstanding rookies of the season on a forward line with two of his new stars of last year, and the new line turned into a high-scoring trio on its first attempt.

In his first reshuffling of lines since the training season opened, Irvin put young Bunny Dufy of Trail, B. C., on with John Quilty and Joe Benoit, and the line accounted for three goals as the Whites and Reds went 60 minutes to a 5-5 draw.

Benoit scored two of the counters, with Dufy and Quilty assisting, and Quilty bagged the other.

Veteran Murph Chamberlain continued the sparkling play that he has been displaying during the week, giving a goal that appeared to give the Whites the game with 30 seconds to go. Chamberlain left the ice convinced that he had scored the winner, but Ray Gellifield tied it up again for the Reds with 35 seconds to go, for his second goal of the day.

Two rookies combined for the other White goal, when Jim McFadden scored on a pass from Marcel Thebe, his Portland, Ore., team-mate last year.

**Kilpatrick Pleased**

WINNIPEG, Oct. 15 (CP)—Col. John Reed Kilpatrick, president of Madison Square Garden, New York, attended New York Rangers National Hockey League training camp here today and said he was "particularly pleased with the form of the veterans who are playing with

all the enthusiasm of youngsters." "It's a bit too early, of course, to form a definite opinion," he said, "but from what I saw today, I'd say the Rangers look as though they'll have one of the finest teams in their history."

Col. Kilpatrick also was pleased with rookies trying out for berths on Rangers' roster. "They look exceptionally good to me," said the Rangers' No. 1 fan.

On his first visit here in eight years Rangers have trained in Winnipeg, Col. Kilpatrick was accompanied at the workout by Lester Patrick, Rangers' manager, Frank Calder of Montreal, President of the N.H.L., and Mervyn (Red) Dutton, manager of New York Americans.

Americans, also an N. H. L. club are training at Fort Arthur, but Dutton came to Winnipeg to discuss the outlook of hockey and its problems with Calder, he said.

**Chapman Handles Amerks**

PORT ARTHUR, Oct. 15 (CP)—Coach Art Chapman of Winnipeg sent the New York Americans through a lively two-hour workout at the National Hockey League team's training camp here today while Manager Mervyn (Red) Dutton conferred with Frank Calder, president of the N. H. L. in Winnipeg.

seven bombers and a fighter and shot down four German fighters, according to the air ministry. Quays and ships at Le Havre were bombed.

Tuesday night's attacks were aimed at southern Germany.

The air ministry said the Germans up to now had found it necessary to use more than half their fighter strength against the R. A. F. in the west, thus weakening the Germans' aerial punch against Russia.

At the same time it was indicated that Britain is gaining strength in production and importation of combat aircraft.

A usually reliable source said also that air minister Sir Archibald Sinclair is considering a plan to send some of the R. A. F.'s ace bomber and fighter pilots on recruiting campaigns through the Dominions.

The same source said the output of personnel by the commonwealth air training plan is 60 per cent higher for the second quarter of this year than in the first quarter and 100 per cent higher in the third quarter than in the first.

The informant gave no total figures, in accordance with the official policy of withholding information likely to be of use to the enemy, but he did say there was a plane available for every crew reaching the United Kingdom.

There was no precise indication of how many crews are reaching the United Kingdom, but the flow is believed considerably larger than hitherto and is expected to increase progressively as training facilities are developed in Canada and the United States.

against us all the reserves of his equipment and when British-American aid is only beginning to develop."

The Soviet press urged a people's defence of Moscow—such as has helped in holding Leningrad so long—and appealed that not a square yard of the city be abandoned.

The capital remained calm. People not required for the defence of the city were leaving. The blast of the founders of Bolshevism, was closed. It was not stated whether this had any direct connection with Moscow's military peril.

Just how far the Germans had progressed in the drive from the west was not known here, but as far as could be learned they had not yet reached Borodino, 70 miles west of the capital, where Napoleon fought his last great battle short of Moscow in 1812.

(An authoritative source in London said, however, that fighting was heavy around Mozhaisk, 10 miles east of Borodino and within 60 miles of Moscow, although the Germans apparently had not yet captured the town.)

(As to the situation above Moscow he declared it was possible that the Nazis had occupied Rzhev, which is 125 miles northwest of the capital, and advanced on to the east.

(Reuters reported that in the far south—a theatre now overshadowed by the great struggle for Moscow—the German advance east of Mariupol along the coast of the Sea of Azov toward Rostov on the Don River had been halted by heavy losses.

(Snow and rain were said to be hampering large-scale movements in the Ukraine.

**Neutral Opinion**

(A high ranking neutral observer in London thus summed up the situation about Moscow:—

"Hitler for the first time in two years of war has thrown every available gun and tank into one attack. If he fails to take Moscow or destroy the Russian armies in the present drive—and he well may fall—Germany is finished until spring and might well have lost the war."

(He expressed considerable optimism as to the Soviet chances of holding off the assaults on Moscow and gaining a respite, but was less hopeful of Russia's ability to establish an effective line of resistance in the east if the capital falls.)

## Officials meet To discuss Players' status

WINNIPEG, Oct. 15 (CP)—The Winnipeg Free Press says National Hockey League officials, headed by President Frank Calder, met here today to discuss status of many of their players who have come under jurisdiction of the Manitoba Divisional War Services Board.

The Free Press says: "At the conference, besides Mr. Calder, were Col. John R. Kilpatrick, president of Madison Square Garden, New York; Lester Patrick, vice-president of Madison Square Gardens, and O. Mervyn (Red) Dutton, owner of New York Americans."

Mr. Justice J. F. L. Embury, chairman of the Saskatchewan Board, ruled Sept. 19 that Saskatchewan players liable for military training will not be granted passports (by this board.)

"Continuing, the boss of New York Americans said, there have been different interpretations and rulings across Canada and we're here to ascertain if the decision here sticks. If it does I lose, between Manitoba and Saskatchewan, eight of my players."

"Asked about the N. H. L.'s stand on the current passport regulations Mr. Calder said, 'naturally we will abide by the laws of the land.'

"You can quote me on one thing—the most war-ridden country in the world outside of Russia today, is Great Britain, and Great Britain is carrying on with sport in typical British style. Surely therefore there should be no reason why we, on this side, should not follow suit in the same tradition. Only a few weeks ago 60,000 people attended a football match in England—and one of the most interested spectators was the Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill."

"Asked just blank if he thought passport restrictions would affect the calibre of hockey in the N.H.L. this winter, Mr. Calder chuckled, and please remember this, we are not going to call it quits just because a few difficulties are thrown in our way."

**SIGN THREE ROOKIES**

DETROIT, Oct. 14 (AP)—Detroit Red Wings today signed three rookies to contracts as Manager Jack Adams continued to send his squad of 40 through two practice seasons a day. In preparation for the National Hockey League season.

The recruits are Johnny Holota of Guelph, Ont.; Jerry Brown of Edmonton, Alta., and Defenceman Cully Simon of Brockville, Ont. Holota is 21 years old, Simon 23 and Brown 25.

**Free surgery And treatment For volunteers**

OTTAWA, Oct. 15 (CP)—Young men called up for military service and found unfit because of some curable condition soon will be offered surgical and hospital treatment free of charge, an official of the Department of National War Services, intimated today.

He said a plan for offering this service to men called up in order to make them fit for any duties has been worked out but has not yet been placed in effect.

Leading surgeons of the country have offered their services and agreed to perform necessary operations on such men free of charge. It remains to arrange for the hospitalization cost.

## Chairman war Board meets Hockey prexy

WINNIPEG, Oct. 15 (CP)—Mr. Justice J. E. Adamson, chairman of the Manitoba divisional war services board, said tonight that he had "a friendly conversation" today with Frank Calder of Montreal, National Hockey League president.

Mr. Justice Adamson, who on Sept. 12 refused to approve applications for passports presented by six hockey players seeking to play with professional teams in United States, refused to comment further on the meeting with Calder, who also refused comment.

Lt.-Col. C. D. McPherson, Manitoba board registrar, also attended the meeting between Calder and the chairman and said tonight they "just met for a little introductory

talk."

"The Judge agreed to meet Mr. Calder and Mr. Coyne (J.D. Coyne, Winnipeg lawyer) in a friendly way," the registrar said.

(Lt.-Col. McPherson said last month that no Manitoba hockey players unmarried before July 15, 1940, will be given passport authority because they are "top notch material for the armed forces.")

Asked tonight if the board is reconsidering its ruling on passport authority for hockey players, Lt.-Col. McPherson said: "There has been no change in the board's ruling as far as I know."

Today's meeting was not an official meeting of the board, the registrar said.

"All hockey players have the right to make application for passport authority," he said. "I don't know what future attitude the board will take."
