LONDON, Sept. 22 (CP)—Except for three hours daily, British housewives this winter will be able to cook without fear of interruption by power cut-off. The nationalized electricity industry has announced a 50-per-cent relaxation of last winter's restrictions which made cooking an uncertain adventure.

**Navy Gears Planning To Provide Anti-Sub Protection**

This is one of a series in which a Canadian Press military writer sums up the defence situation in Canada. In today's story he deals with anti-submarine preparations. Tomorrow: Reserves.

 OTTAWA, Sept. 22 (CP)—The Canadian Navy is beginning to look into the far north but the main concern remains familiar enemies—the North Atlantic and submarines.

The navy's chief, Vice-Admiral H. T. W. Grant has said: "Naval policy is based on the assumption that our principal role in war would be the protection of shipping from submarines, mining and air attacks and that the maximum possible protection should be available without notice."

It remains an anti-submarine navy and its advanced training, both in the new air arm and in the surface ships, chiefly points in that direction.

The background lies in the knowledge that Russia has four times as many submarines as Germany had in 1939 and that developments are such that in any new war, escort fleets would have to be twice as large and twice as fast as they were in the last one.

To prepare itself, the navy has no subs and relies on the British and American fleets for them. It hasn't got the facilities to do the research necessary to cope with sub developments and relies on metal allies for that, too. Its manpower isn't sufficient, informed quarters say, to permit full concentration on both anti-sub and recruit training and it may be in danger of falling between the two.

**Reaches Full Strength**

The Navy was the first of the three services to recruit to authorized post-war strength—9,060—and it is quite rightly described as the one regular service capable of doing a fair-sized combat job on an immediate basis.

With the 18,000-ton aircraft carrier Magnificent, two destroyers, three frigates and two minesweepers active on the east coast, the 8,000-ton cruiser Ontario, two destroyers, two frigates and two minesweepers active when the coast was icy, it could put up an immediate

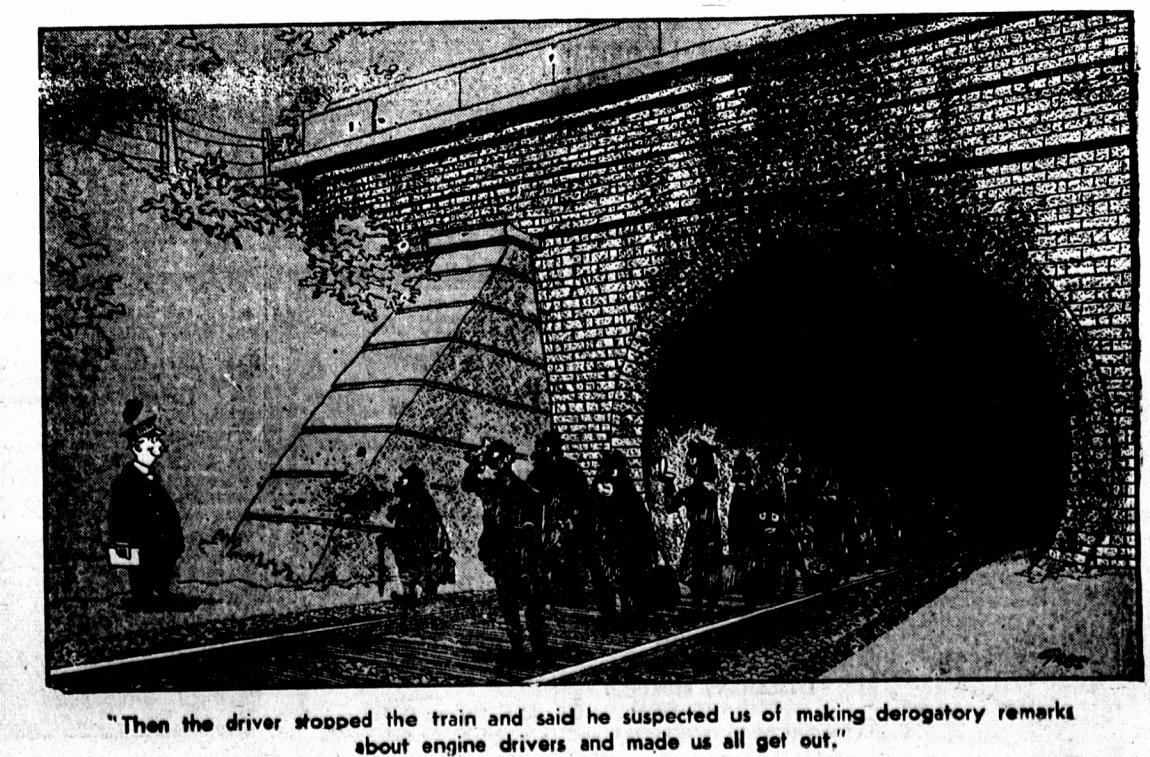
