NEW EUROPEAN NAVAL RACE?

Russia To Build Super Battleships

LONDON, Nov. 20.—(C. P. Havas)—Soviet Russia has advised the British Government it plans to build 45,000-ton battleships because of Japanese construction of heavier war vessels, it was learned tonight. Although this decision, according to the Soviet communication, affects in principle only Russia's Far Eastern fleet, it was feared in some quarters here that Germany and Italy, and then France, might follow suit. Thus the Soviet move might mean the beginning of a new European naval rearmament race.

CANADA WILL LOSE HEAVILY ON IMPORT TAX

Much Depends On Interpretation Put On New Trade Agreement.

OTTAWA, Nov. 20 (CP)—Canada will lose considerable revenue by relinquishing the 3 per cent import excise tax in respect of those items enumerated in the schedule of the new trade agreement with the United States, National revenue officials are agreed that receipts from this source will be drastically cut, but no one would venture a guess on what the loss will be.

Good Revenue Producer

This tax has been a good revenue producer since its inception in 1930. In the fiscal year ended March 31, 1935, a total of \$15,007,274 was collected from this source.

In the fiscal year ended March 31, 1936, there was a decline to \$12,939,181. The figures were \$15,415,315 and \$18,621,448. During the first seven months of the present fiscal year the collections have totalled \$9,533,657.
