



Had a letter from R. L. Todd ('Foxy') Todd of Single, Todd 215 fame last evening and it was very entertaining. Mr. Todd and son Wilfred are making money like shells with new type and platinum foxes. For recreation B. L. takes a seat on the veranda of the Metropolitan Speedway club house and watches Danny Steele—formerly of Summerside—around the track. It is only about 60 feet away. According to Mr. Todd the fastest trotter in sight this Spring during the juveniles is James St. James's two-year-old filly Sunny Girl. She has been a quarter of a slow mile in 34 seconds.

Directum J. Junior 2.06, owned by Mr. Sullivan, is looking simply splendid and Mr. Todd says—"If this bird doesn't stop the watch in two minutes this year then I'm no judge." He is very sweet on David Gentles' Rot Hanover 2.08 1-2 in Dannie Steele's stable. This horse has been in New Hampshire winter and looks like a two-minute trotter. The fastest aged trotter at the Speedway is Dr. Thompson's Hollywood Harmon 2.07, a six-year-old number of Dannie's stable. He took part in five races last year winning four of them. His record was taken at Pawtucket, R. I., July 21st. Hollywood Harmon was recently advertised for sale by Dr. Thompson. He is eligible to the 2.18 trot.

They are beating the 2.20 mark regularly in workouts at Orlando, Florida. The two-year-old Hal Dale, pacing colt Hal Trim, heavily favored in 2.20 when he was last quarter in the last quarter in 31 1-4 seconds. A two-year-old colt by Proctor (3.15) 1-4, Don Juna, was a mile in 2.20 with the last quarter in 32 seconds. Ben White worked the two-year-old pacing filly Pay Starling in 2.18 3-4 with the last quarter in 31 1-4 seconds. Tommy Berry drove the three-year-old trotting colt Green Diamond in 2.20 1-4 with the final quarter in 34 seconds. Bruins Need Only One More Victory To Clinch World's Hockey Ch'ship

DETROIT, April 10 (CP)—The Boston Bruins National Hockey League champions made it three straight victories over the Detroit Red Wings in the Stanley Cup finals with a 4-2 conquest here before 10,137 spectators tonight, and drew within a game of possession of the venerable Joe trophy.

The defeat brought the Red Wings battling with a rookie-filled line up to the brink of elimination from the Cup series. Boston now can win the Cup by beating Detroit in the fourth game here Saturday night.

Twice tonight in the first period the Bruins on the dazzling individual work of Milt Schmidt and Eddie Wiseman, came from behind to nullify Detroit goals.

The night of the champions became evident in the second period when Schmidt bagged his second goal of the evening, a terrific 25-foot shot that caught goalie Johnny Mowers flat-footed, 59 seconds after the period opened, to put the Bruins ahead for the first time.

The Bostonians controlled the game after that, holding the frantic playing Red Wings with the aid of some sensational saves by goalie Frank Brimsek and adding a fourth goal by Art Jackson, three minutes before the end of the game, while Alex Motter was in the penalty box.

Both teams were at top speed as tonight's game opened, and in the fourth minute of play, Bill Jennings' short goal on a pass from Don Grosso was quickly matched 42 seconds later when Wiseman lifted Roy Conacher's rebound over the diving Mowers.

Sid Abel sent Detroit ahead three minutes later and Schmidt in the fifteenth minute equalized matters with his first goal, skating in alone after eluding Detroit defenseman Jimmy Orlando.

Schmidt's second goal, however, was the most stunning blow of the Boston attack, as he came in fast to pick up a pass from behind the goal and blast the puck knee-high past the amazed Detroit goalie.

On a point basis with eight for a first place vote, seven for second six for third, etc., the Reds received a total of 640 points. The Dodgers, who were picked for every place from first to sixth, obtained 538 points, 51 more than the Redbirds, whose vote was spread from first to seventh but skipped the sixth-place slot.

Beneath this triumvirate there was a considerable variety of opinion except on the Phillies, whom 80 of the 83 writers frankly figured to land in the cellar for the fourth straight year.

Based on total points, the vote forecast the entire league would wind up in the same order it finished last year. But New York Giants were spotted in every position except first and Pittsburgh Pirates in every bracket except first and last.

Bruised, battered Red Wings revise lineup for tonight

DETROIT, April 11—(AP)—All but out of the Stanley Cup playoffs, the bruised and battered Detroit Red Wings, three down to Boston Bruins in the best-of-seven series, underwent some lineup changes today.

Manager Jack Adams said Harold Jackson would be back on defense and that Alex Motter would play centre on a line with Carl Liscombe and probably Eddie Wares in tomorrow night's fourth game here.

Jackson was benched in the last game. Wares, who has been ailing with an injured shoulder, will replace Ken Kilrea if he is ready to play.

So far it has been all Boston. The Bruins won the first three games by respective scores of 3-2, 2-1, and 4-2, and need only a victory in the next encounter to become the first team to win the cup in four straight games.

All the more uncomfortable for the Red Wings' point of view is the fact they have at least 12 games since April 5, 1940.

During the last two seasons teams which lost players through enlistments or transfer of enlisted men were allowed to obtain replacements any time before the team entered inter-provincial playdowns.

The proposed rule which will be discussed by the 30-odd delegates from all parts of the Dominion would allow replacements only within a set period after a player has left a club.
