G. S. Inman, Montague, was in the City Saturday.

Fred D. Brehaut, Murray River, was in this city Saturday, registering at the Victoria.

Tomorrow night in the lecture room of Zion Church Rev. R. G. Strathin will deliver his popular lecture entitled "Climbing the Ladder."

The funeral of the late Mrs. Robert Stevenson, Fredericton, takes place Wednesday afternoon at one o'clock from her late residence to the New Glasgow cemetery.

The hockey match in Halifax between the Crescent and New Glasgow professional teams resulted in a decisive victory for the Halifax boys. They won out in a very fast game by the score of seven to three.

The Earl Grey took to Pictou Saturday sixty-two tons of freight, fourteen passengers and forty bags of mail. The Minto took to Georgetown nine tons of freight, thirty passengers and one hundred bags of mail.

Walter Burke, City, gave a most entertaining selection of moving pictures before the young people of Grace Church Sunday School, on Friday evening last. The school-room was filled and the pictures were greatly enjoyed by all present.

The supreme Court meets this morning at eleven o'clock. All civil and criminal cases have been disposed of and the only remaining matters are arguments and motions which may occupy the attention of the court for some days.

Last week was a record one in Police Court cases. During the latter part of 1910 and the first two weeks in January the court was kept busy all the time with a variety of cases and the first lull occurred last week when there were no cases of any kind on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday. On Friday there was one drunk and on Saturday a prohibition conviction.

Previous to the departure of Philip Brydges who has been the efficient and capable foreman at Bruce Stewart & Co's. for a number of years, as a mark of esteem from his fellow workmen he was presented with a valuable dress suit, case and pipe. There can be no greater evidence of showing in what esteem a man is held by his fellow workmen than by occasions of this kind.

Tomorrow morning the demurrer in the case of Peter Gillis vs. Margaret Murphy will be heard in the Chancery Court before the Vice Chancellor, Neil McLeod, K. C., appears for the plaintiff and J. B. Wyatt for the defendants. Through the week the court will decide in the case of the request contained in the will of the late Robert McLaughlin, City, who left the sum of \$375 to St. James' Church, the remainder in his will saying that this sum was owed by him to that church. This money has now been paid in to court by the executors for disposal by the court. It appears that the deceased owed no money to St. James' Church but had previously subscribed the sum of \$300 to a fund for the church and also owed \$75 for pew rent.


The death took place on Saturday morning in the P. E. Island Hospital of Benjamin B. Profit, Augustine Cove. The deceased entered the hospital some time ago, suffering from blood poisoning in the hand which he succumbed. On Saturday afternoon the body was removed from the hospital and taken by train to Cape Traverse and thence forwarded to Augustine Cove. The remains were accompanied by Mrs. Profit who came to this city on Wednesday on learning that her husband was becoming worse.

The late Mr. Profit was an energetic and hard working man and in whatever community he resided he was highly popular. The deceased was about fifty years of age and was born in New London. About fourteen years ago he removed to Alberton and four years later located in Augustine Cove. Besides his widow he leaves to mourn a family of seven, some of whom are at home and some abroad. The funeral will probably take place tomorrow, Tuesday to the Tryon Cemetery. The children who reside abroad have been telegraphed for. The Guardian extends sympathy to the bereaved family.

KING GEORGE IS AN EARLY RISER.

King George, since he came to the throne, has surprised those about him with the rapidity with which he works and the quickness with which he can make himself the master of any document or state paper that is put in front of him. The late King was deliberate in his methods, and liked to consider every point with the greatest care. The present King, on the other hand, takes everything at top speed, but there is nothing that misses his eye. He is naturally a rapid thinker, and possesses a wonderfully retentive memory.

He is a very early riser, and, whether he is staying at York Cottage, Windsor Castle or Buckingham Palace, his cup of coffee and roll and butter are taken to his room a little before seven. By eight o'clock he is seated at his desk, and is going through the papers that have accumulated from the previous day. He reads carefully every letter that reaches him, no matter how humble the source, and when he has finished it he pencils a few instructions upon it and places it in one of the red morocco leather despatch boxes that stand in front of him.

There are many papers of course, that cannot be dealt with by the King in a moment or two, and these are placed on one side for more careful consideration. Between ten and eleven in the forenoon communications from the Prime Minister and the heads of the various government departments reach the King, and by this time his two most trusted advisers, Lord Knollys and Sir Arthur Biggs, are at his elbow ready to advise him. It is stated about the court that among the last words of the late King to his son on his death bed were "Trust Knollys," and to this King George has steadily adhered. He does not maintain that regular and voluminous correspondence with the heads of foreign Powers

for recreation of one form or another. The evening, however, finds him back at work again, planning through the matters that have been submitted for his consideration during the day and he is like to have everything clear contrives to keep his afternoons free before he retires for the night.
