THE POPE'S HORROR OF ATROCIOUS CRIME

LONDON, June 24.—Discussing the Vatican and the war, the Morning Post says the Pope expressed his horror at some of the more atrocious crimes but with regard to what many Catholics believe to have been the supreme inquiry the Pope remains silent. For two generations Germany has been taught to believe in the justice not only of the present war, but of all wars. Those who exercise their private judgment must form their own decision but those who look to the supreme authority of the Church hitherto looked in vain for direction on a matter which intimately affects momentous spiritual issues.

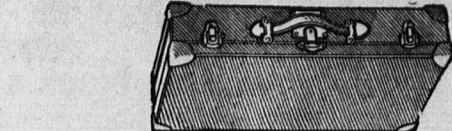
