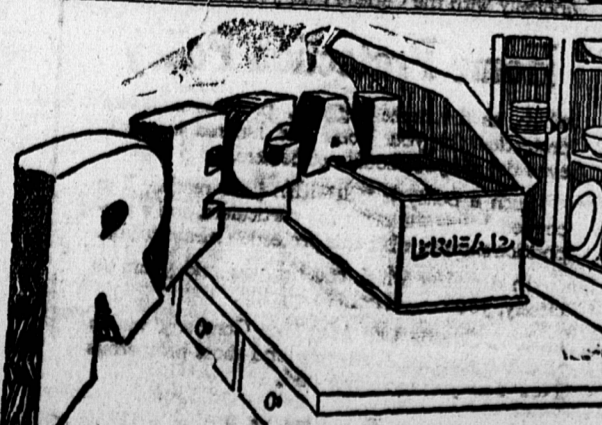

AGE OF THE CHRISTMAS CARD

Could you say offhand how old is the Christmas card which is now making its annual appearance in the shop? It is younger than most people imagine, for its age is only about seventy years. There would seem to be two claimants (both famous) to the honor of having invented it. According to some, Cuthbert Beale designed the first card when a student at Durham university in 1845, and designs of his circulated among his friends for two years before the printers conceived the idea of offering similar cards for sale to the general public. Others claim the invention for Horsley, the artist, who designed one for Sir Henry Cole in 1846. And a specimen of this card has fetched as much as £50.

CANADA'S VEGETABLE OUTPUT

OTTAWA, Dec. 18.—Canada's exports of agricultural and vegetable products to the United States during October 1922, decreased by almost half from the total of October of last year, according to a statement issued by the Federal Bureau of Statistics. Exports of vegetable products increased, however, bringing the total exports higher than those of October, 1921. Agricultural and vegetable products exported to the United States last month were valued at \$8,308,248, as against \$6,244,492 in October 1921. Total exports to the
