Distinctions For Gallant Soldier

The London papers of a recent date just to hand contain a very highly complimentary reference to Captain Gerald Fenwick Haszard, R. M. A. Captain Haszard is the only son of the late Captain Fenwick Haszard, R. N., a brother of Mr. Horace Haszard. Captain Gerald Haszard has distinguished himself more than once in the war, and he has lately been again mentioned for honors in despatches. Some time ago he won the distinction of the D.S.O. decoration, and now he has gained a Bar to his order.

"Bar to Distinguished Service Cross"

Captain Gerald Fenwick Haszard, R. M. A., has on many occasions shown an example of coolness under fire. Twice in one month when the bombardment was very heavy he went to the assistance of wounded men. On July 15, 1917, when a dugout was blown in by a shell he extracted two severely wounded men under heavy shell fire and carried them to a place of safety. On July 28th, 1917, whilst his gun position and the road adjoining were under heavy and continuous shell fire, a dump of heavy ammunition was blown up causing a great cavity in the road. An ambulance containing wounded officers and men fell into the shell hole. Captain Haszard immediately went out and with the help of Gunner Walker, R. M. A., who was wounded directly afterwards and died subsequently, carried the wounded officers on his back into an adjoining dugout. He then returned and brought in the wounded man. In addition to the above Captain Haszard has also been decorated by the French Government with the "Croix de Guerre" with silver star, and leading Paris papers make most complimentary reference to his gallantry as a soldier and as an officer.

Welcome To Returned Soldiers

Notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather quite a large number of people gathered in the Hall in "Fredericton" P. E. I. to extend a hearty welcome to two returned heroes, namely Sergt. D. S. Bertram and Pte. George McLean. Both these men had been quite seriously wounded and still show evidence of the hardship they endured.

Mr. Richard A. Elliott acted as chairman in a most acceptable manner. A short program was well presented after which the following address was read by Mr. N. S. J. Murray and a five dollar gold piece presented to the two returned soldiers by Miss Marguerite Elliott.

To Sergt. D. S. Bertram and Pte. George McLean: "Dear Sirs:—We your friends and associates have met here tonight to extend to you a royal and heart-welcome, which you so nobly deserve. When our King and Country called for volunteers for service overseas unreservedly offered yourselves. You entered the conflict in the earlier stages of the conflict and now you have the honor of knowing that you have done your part in this Great War, and not only your native Province but the whole Dominion is proud of your achievements. In welcoming you home we deem it our duty to express our admiration for the noble and courageous spirit that prompted you to take up arms in behalf of our King and Country, and to suffer for the cause of humanity. In conclusion we ask you to accept this token in appreciation of the services you have rendered and we fondly hope that before long you may regain your former health and strength, and that your sacrifices may not have been in vain."

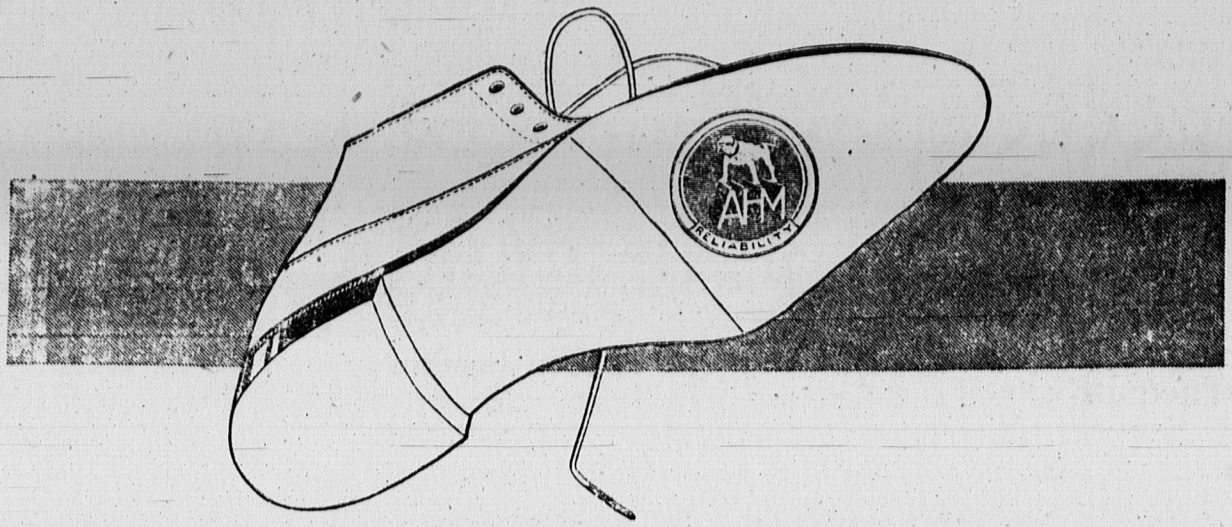

McLean was unavoidably detained from being present, but his brother, Mr. Sterling McLean, on behalf of his soldier brother, thanked the gathering for the good wishes expressed. Short addresses were given by Rev. L. J. Leard, Mr. Geo. S. McLeod, Mr. Ham Warren, Mr. Malcolm Gillis, after which refreshments were served by the ladies.

The following is a copy of a letter received by Mrs. Amelia M. Smith, 187 Moore St. Lowell, Mass., a few days ago from her son No. 713126 Pte. Fred J. Smith. He was among the first to enlist in the 105th Battalion but was unable to cross over with him on account of being ill in the hospital with measles which developed after the measles. After recovering from that he took a course in musketry in Halifax and crossed over in England with the 105th draft last May.

He remained in England until November when he with some others volunteered to go to France.

He was then transferred to the 26th Battalion. He always seems to be in good spirits and is proud of the fact that he voted before he was twenty one.

France, March 5th, 1918.

Dear Mother:—

Am writing you only a few lines today to inform you that I have just received the lovely parcel which you

mailed me on February 5th. It is certainly without a doubt the best birthday present I ever got and I don't know exactly how to thank you for it. I surely do feel deeply grateful to you for being so kind and thoughtful as to go to the trouble of getting up so large and varied a gift. There is not much I can do here to show my appreciation of it but if I should get home once more I will try and show my gratitude in a proper manner. The cake and all the other articles were in perfect condition and when I ate of the dainties you can rest assured I enjoyed them immensely. The butter was the first I have tasted since I left Canada, Margarine being principally used in the army.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. An certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after securing homestead patent; also so acres extra cultivation. Fee—\$100 per acre may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Fee \$300 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 20 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. CORY, C. M. G.
