On Saturday last the new hall at Webster's Corner, Fort Augustus was opened auspiciously. Among those from Charlottetown who attended the opening were Premier Peter, Hon. J. H. Cummiskey, C. P. W., Major Weeks and Profs. Arsenault and McDonald of the P. W. College. They were met by carriages at Hickey's wharf and driven to the Hall. Shortly after the hour announced for the opening Mr. Cummiskey, President of the Hall Company, escorted Premier Peter, Rev. A. J. McDonald and the Fort Augustus choir and a number of others to the platform in the hall. The President took the chair and opened the proceedings and stated that as the company wished to have the opening of a non-political character, Premier Peter although present would not offer any remarks; and he, Mr. Cummiskey, would speak only as the President of the Company. Major Weeks was then called upon by the chairman and delivered an excellent opening address, complimenting the people of Fort Augustus on the fine new hall which he understood was the supplying of a long felt want. At the conclusion of his remarks, the Major was loudly applauded. Professors Arsenault and McDonald followed in neat and appropriate speeches showing the advantages of such institutions throughout the country, and the benefit derived therefrom, President Cummiskey then requested as there were no more speeches on the program, that the National Anthem be sung, whereupon Father Allan, Rev. A. J. McDonald and the Fort Augustus choir heartily responded—the audience rising and joining in. The President in the name of the company then declared the hall opened and also extended a cordial welcome to all to patronize the occasion by their presence.

The people of Alberton were painfully affected last Wednesday on learning, by telegram, that death had deprived them of one of their most respected townswomen, Mrs. James F. White who passed away on the 16th inst; at the residence of her brother, Mr. Matthew Murphy, Charlottetown. Mrs. White had been confined to her bed for some time past and had gone to Charlottetown with the hope of effecting a speedy recovery. But medical skill and affectionate nursing proved unable to turn aside the death blow. Strengthened and consoled by the last rites of the Church, she quietly expired, on Tuesday night, in the presence of her husband and a number of friends whose kindly ministrations soiced the last hours of her life. Her remains were transported to Alberton by the midnight express on Wednesday and lay enshrouded in her own home until Friday when they were interred in the Catholic Cemetery. In the absence of the pastor, the High Mass of Requiem was celebrated by the Rev. J. C. Murphy, who also officiated at the bier and grave. The choral part of the church's burial service sung by a full choir, was ably rendered and added much to the solemnity of an occasion which is indeed the most stirring we experience in life. Mrs. White's solo at the Offertory, an exquisite rendition of the "De Profundis," was especially pathetic. After the chanting of the "Libera" the body was conveyed to the grave-yard by the pall-bearers, the Hon. R. B. Reid, George Tweedy Esq., Messrs. John Aznew, Joseph L. Dyer, James P. Cunningham and John P. Fielding. The floral offerings were magnificent contributed by friends both in Charlottetown and Alberton. The sincere sympathy of the whole community goes out spontaneously to the afflicted husband and family who have been bereaved of one so near and dear. Mrs. White parted this life lamented by all, as she was well thought of in the social circles of every denomination, and her many truly Christian qualities as a member of society will be long remembered in the community of which she formed a part.
